

#### AMERICAN CLAN GREGOR SOCIETY COUNCIL MEETING August 31, 1990

The Chieftain, Abbey W. Magruder, Jr., opened the Council Meeting in the Golden Gate Room of the Doubletree Hotel at Santa Rosa, California, at 8:45 PM.

The Chaplain, Horatio Richardson, delivered the invocation.

The Scribe, McGregor Gray, was asked for his minutes of the last Council Meeting. He stated that the minutes were published in the 1989 Yearbook. There being no additions or corrections, the minutes were adopted as published.

The Treasurer, James Wooley, Jr., gave his report, which had been distributed in advance to Council Members. He pointed out that this was an interim report which would be updated to the end of the fiscal year and published in the Yearbook. The report was accepted with thanks for the obvious effort and detail.

The Registrar, Frances Browne, reported a total of 18 new members, of which 16 are lineal and two are Associate Members. There were four new Junior Members. One changed status from lineal to Life Membership. There was one reinstatement.

The Registrar introduced two cases of questionable applications for membership. A man with the surname of Evans used the evidence of a reprint of an "Order of Scottish Clans" as evidence that his family tradition that they were MacGregors was valid and his application should be accepted. The Registrar returned the application with a request for further documentation. She rejected the application since the name Evans did not appear in any of the standard lists which she uses. In the meantime she discovered in Black's Surnames of Scotland that an Evan MacGregor, by an Act of parliament, was permitted to bear the name Evans and his sons the name Evanson. During the discussion which followed, Sir Gregor pointed out that Evans was a common Welsh name and that Mr. Evans was not necessarily descended from Evan MacGregor. A motion was approved asking the Registrar to inform Mr. Evans that he would have to provide further documentation before his application could be accepted.

In the second case, twins named Sonya and Tanya Witt, aged 20, submitted applications based upon extensive documentation and research back to an ancestor, William McGehee, born ca. 1677. However, the author of the book of genealogy in which he was listed felt that William might not be MacGregor since he was not baptised until he was twelve and his name did not appear in his father's will. After some discussion the Council decided to accept the baptismal certificate and ignore the doubts. The twins will be accepted.

A third case of a Mr. James E. Clark of Birmingham who claims MacGregor descent through lineage from a Kirkpatrick was referred back to the applicant for documentation that the Kirkpatrick in his ancestry was indeed a MacGregor.

The Historian, Helen Garrett, reported that there had been eight births to members, two marriages, eight deaths of members and three deaths of relatives of members during the past year.

The Editor, Maggie Gregg, reported that the Yearbook, despite the weather, had finally been published with only a few minor corrections which would be corrected.

For the Trustees, Pat Bierer reported that the Edward May Magruder Scholarship presently has a market value of \$160,000.00. At the moment, the University of Virginia has not informed us of this year's recipient. The John Kennedy Magruder Scholarship at the University presently has \$41,000.00 in it. This year's recipient has yet to be named. The Marion Virginia Magruder Scholarship at Randolph Macon Woman's College presently has \$41,000.00 in it. This year's recipient is Wendy Knick, a freshman. The Harry and Edith Blunt Scholarship fund now has \$20,000.00 in it. The Trustees decided to start awarding stipends to recipients beginning in the summer of 1991 in time for the school year.

The Assistant Chieftain, Joseph Tichy, gave his report. He has culled the list of members and now has a firm membership of 592 active members and 31 junior members. One hundred seventy-six have registered for the Gathering and 178 will be at the banquet. This was more than he expected and compares favorably with the Denver Gathering. He announced details of the shuttle bus to the Games on Saturday and Sunday. The last bus from the fairgrounds will leave at ten PM on Saturday to accommodate the barbeque after the Games. Reduced price tickets are available for \$11.00 for both days from our sales desk. Senior citizens were asked not to purchase these tickets until younger members had made their purchases, since seniors get substantial discounts. The Society has 35 box seats which will be passed around during the weekend. Grandstand tickets cost \$1.50.

The 1991 Gathering will be held at the historic Jefferson Sheraton Hotel in Richmond, Virginia on October 17, 18 and 19. The decor of the hotel rivals that of the Dupont Hotel in Wilmington, Delaware but the price is right: \$76.00 a night.

Peg and Joe Tichy reported on correspondence with former Chieftain Russell McGregor, who is suffering from terminal illness. A card was circulated and signed by Council Members wishing him well.

Joe Tichy and Joe Foss who, with Newton Gregg, formed the Gathering Committee, reported on the extensive facilities at the Highland Games reserved for the MacGregors. They also reported on the chaos caused by the hotel selling all the rooms which had been reserved by our Pipe Band. The Council applauded their efforts in making this Gathering a success.

In his address to the Council, the Chieftain, Abbey Magruder, welcomed our hereditary Chief, Sir Gregor MacGregor, and his wife Fanny. Then he thanked all of the Officers of the Society and other members of the Council who have helped make his tour in office a success. He reviewed the list of goals outlined by Russell McGregor and listed progress in several areas. Only the plan for a Society Center was on hold, but our Chieftain noted that he would personally support the Center financially if and when it was deemed feasible.

Sir Gregor replied, reminding us it had been six years since he was last with us. Since then a lot has happened in the Scottish Clan Gregor Society. Sheila MacGregor has not been re-elected to the Council, which should result in much improved cooperation between the Societies. The Scottish Society's lawsuit against her continues, but will probably be settled out of court. The Society no longer has any connection with the MacGregor Center. Sir Gregor mentioned the activities of Mrs. Frost in Ohio which do not have the backing of the Scottish Clan Society. Her Clan Gregor Foundation is likewise unsupported.

Sir Gregor reported that a Southwest Chapter of the Clan Gregor Society had been founded in Texas. At the request of the Society the new Chapter had submitted its by-laws. They were returned with comments on their inaccuracies and suggestions for corrections, whereupon the Texans disagreed and will therefore not be affiliated with Scotland unless they accept the opinions of the parent body. Our Chief is delighted with the cooperation between the ACGS and the Scottish Society. In 1992 on the 170th anniversary of the founding of the Scottish Clan Gregor Society it plans to hold an International Gathering of MacGregors, from August 20th to 30th. The ACGS will be kept closely informed of developments as they occur. Five days will be spent on the campus of the University of Sterling and six on the campus of the University of Dundee. Joe Tichy will keep us advised.

Unfinished business: The Ranking Deputy Chieftain, George McGregor, asked and received the Council's support for the guidelines for State Deputy Chieftains, developed primarily through the efforts of Lou McGregor.

New business: George McGregor stated that he has been in periodic contact with David Winder, the Treasurer of CGS, in person and through correspondence. George proposed, and the Council agreed, that the ACGS send them invitations to our Gatherings.

Sir Gregor cautioned the ACGS about the problems posed by the difference in qualifications in membership in the CGS and the ACGS. Whereas, in time past, it was the CGS which was more restrictive, it is now the ACGS which has stricter rules, which may cause some resentment if membership applications are not treated with tact and consideration. Abbey Magruder, in reply, stressed the family nature of the two groups and the need to remain firm on our ground rules and slow to change.

Joe Tichy noted that 18 members of the California Chapter of the Scottish Society would be attending our banquet.

Joe Tichy reported that James Maxwell had willed \$500.00 to the ACGS. He requested and received Council approval to put this bequest into the Blunt Scholarship fund.

Maggie Gregg requested more contributions to the newsletter from the members and suggested that a topic for inclusion in the newsletter should be news of the recipients of the various ACGS scholarships.

Joe Tichy reported that more than ten members of the Council had petitioned the Council to make a change in the By-Laws increasing the list of names of those eligible for Chieftainship. After discussion, including cogent remarks by Sir Gregor on the way in which the CGS had faced the problem of MacGregor names, it was agreed that Article VI, Section IV, Subsection a be amended to include "Grier, Grierson, McGehee and Gregg, however spelled."

#### GENERAL MEETING August 31, 1990

The General Meeting of the American Clan Gregor Society was called to order by the Chieftain, Abbey W. Magruder, Jr. in the Kanayawa Room of the Doubletree Hotel of Santa Rosa, California at 9:45 AM, August 31, 1990.

The Chaplain, Rev. Horatio M. Richardson, gave the invocation.

The Scribe, McGregor Gray, read the minutes of the 1990 Council Meeting. The nominated slate of officers as approved by the Council was proposed to the meeting. There being no nominations from the floor, the nominees were voted into office unanimously.

The Treasurer's Report was submitted by James E. Woolley, Jr., the Treasurer. The net worth of the Society is \$109,000.00.

The Registrar, Frances Browne, gave her report, then introduced the new members present and then introduced those who were attending their first Gathering.

The Historian, Helen Garrett, gave her report in full. Like other reports, it will be published in the Yearbook.

The Editor, Maggie Gregg, reported on the publication of the Yearbook under very difficult conditions due to Hurricane Hugo. She asked for photographs, especially of children. She was loudly applauded for her efforts.

The Librarian, Mason Lummis, reported that the library is still in storage and asked for suggestions for a suitable location in the Washington, DC area.

Trustee Howard T. Bierer gave the report of the Trustees.

The Assistant Chieftain, Joseph Tichy, reported that, despite the long distance from the geographic center of the Society's membership, 178 would be attending the banquet. He announced that the 1991 Gathering would be held in the historic Jefferson Hotel in Richmond, Virginia on October 17, 18 and 19. In conclusion, he reviewed details concerning our participation in and attendance at the Santa Rosa Scottish Games the next day.

The outgoing Chieftain, Abbey Magruder, gave a brief farewell address and thanked the officers and council members who had served during his tenure. He then introduced Sir Gregor and Lady MacGregor to the meeting.

Sir Gregor discussed the latest developments taking place in the Scottish Clan Gregor Society and announced plans for an International Gathering of MacGregors in Scotland in August of 1992. He underlined the familial nature of the clan organizations and expressed his pleasure at being present.

The Chieftain then called for any unfinished or new business. Bill McGregor took the opportunity to announce the availability of a cotton "Victorian" plaid.

There being no further business, the Chieftain closed the meeting to the acclaim of the assembled membership.

DOUGLAS NEIL MAGRUDER 1904-1989

Douglas Neil Magruder, Clan #588, formerly of Indianola, MS, died Sunday, December 3, 1989 at Cedars Health Center in Tupelo, MS, at the age of 85. He was a communicant of All Saints Episcopal Church in Tupelo.

Neil Magruder was a native of Port Gibson, MS, the son of Robert Walter and Annie Greenwood Neil Magruder. He at one time was a newspaper man, having served as editor of a tri-weekly newspaper in his early twenties in Yazoo City, MS.

Following his employment by the Mississippi State Tax Commission, Neil opened his own accounting firm in Indianola, MS. In 1959 he was elected President of the National Society of Public Accountants. He was a founder and President of the Mississippi Association of Public Accountants (MAPA). In 1988 the Neil Magruder Scholarship Fund was established by MAPA to honor Neil for his outstanding service to the Accounting profession.

Neil served as Chieftain of the American Clan Gregor Society from 1947 to 1950. During his presidency Sir Malcolm MacGregor of MacGregor, Bart., the Hereditary Chief of Clan Gregor, and his wife Lady Gylla, came from Scotland as guests of the American Society which met in Washington, DC. During his tenure as President, Neil was very influencial in bringing the American Clan Gregor Society to its present format of meetings and operations.

Services were held on December 5, 1989 at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Indianola, MS, with his daughter, the Rev. Anna Waid, officiating. Burial in the family plot in the Indianola Cemetary followed. On December 6, 1989, a memorial service was held at All Saints Episcopal Church in Tupelo.

Survivors include his wife, Marjorie Murphy Magruder, Clan #949A, of Traceway Manor, Tupelo; four daughters: Jane Watkins, Clan #965, of Washington, DC, Alice Gordon, Clan #966, of Tupelo, the Rev. Well-known Scottish-born Alex Beaton enthralled us with his singing and banter and then our Pipe Band took over and really got the blood pumping. The mixture of entertainment and the good cheer of the spectators and participants provided fun for all ages and led to a rollicking evening.

The last day of the Gathering started with the General Meeting where the Society got down to business. The meeting was led by Abbey Magruder who recounted the business conducted at the Council Meeting on the first day. Sir Gregor then addressed us, bringing us up to date on the happenings in the Clan Gregor Society in Scotland and expressing his deep satisfaction with our success and progress during recent years.

The meeting ended with the unanimous approval of the Nominating Committee's report naming George F. McGregor of Hendersonville, North Carolina as our new Chieftain.

Our quiet afternoon of leisure and rest was highlighted by a poolside concert by the American Clan Gregor Pipes and Drums. The setting was almost an amphitheater, with the pool half encircled by dark green grass which is in turn backed by a huge profusion of beautiful flowers, all in front of a semi-circle of three of the very attractive campus type hotel buildings. Pipe Major Greg O'Brien led the band in a stirring medley of tunes and the two dancers thrilled us with their agility and gracefulness. # THE SANTA ROSA GAMES by Pauline Johnson

It's very difficult to write objectively of something so long planned, so long anticipated. It was so over-whelming — so many images, sounds and emotions — all crammed into a few days. I'm still somewhat stunned. As a new member of The American Clan, greeting my Chief and his Lady and meeting clansmen for the first time, and unsure of how I will be received by all the "old timers" from back East, I wanted everything to be perfect. Then as membership chairman, hospitality chair-in-effect, and ground-floor planner from the California Chapter, I wanted everything to be even more perfect. It wasn't, of course.

But it was all those wonderful old-fashioned words — thrilling, exhilarating, touching, heart-warming, goose-bumpy. I think everyone enjoyed all the color, pageantry, and the sense of well-being that comes from being surrounded by family — no matter how distant the relationship. For me, it was a particularly gratifying experience. I found a cousin. At least, as soon as Bill and Lou McGregor and I get our genealogies lined up, we believe we have a common progenitor some ten generations back. (No! No! Not a common progenitor, a progenitor in common).

On the whole, Northern California was on its best behavior for the San Francisco Caledonian Club 125th Gathering and Games. There was no earth movement and the weather, while warm and sunny, was not as hot as it can get. We felt the great weather and firm ground was to welcome an unprecedented amount of MacGregor tartan. In the past if we collected ten people outfitted in MacGregor setts at ANY game, it was a cause for celebration . . . and a few bleats of "Watch the cattle! There're more than two MacGregors here!"

It is fitting that the 125th Games should have named Clan Gregor as the Honor Clan, for one Thomas McGregor was instrumental in the founding of the San Francisco Caledonian Club in 1865. The games outgrew a number of locations over the years, several in San Francisco, then Berkeley, Marin County, and Petaluma before finding a home at the huge fairgrounds in Santa Rosa. If this year is any indication, they may outgrow Santa Rosa. For dry stats: there were 22 chiefs or heads of families, 114 clans represented, 41 pipe bands, including "Our Own" and the Black Watch who did not compete; 190 pipers and drummers, who did; and over 400 dancers. I've no count of athletes, but they certainly kept the cabers and soccer balls in motion. Add approximately 37,000 paid at the gate each day, some 10,000 pre-paid and freebie tickets, a horde of concessionaires and their help — and you have a good idea of organized pandemonium.

Our Caledonian Club representatives, Joe Foss and Don Motter staked out a prime location for the Clan Gregor tents on a corner knoll, overlooking the entire clan tent area, where we could see everything and catch the slightest breeze. Behind us, through a hole in the fence, was the deep shade and comparative quiet of the Redwood Grove, which became our own private preserve for the Saturday night barbeque. One wag was heard to remark that MacGregors inevitably commandeered the high ground and ALWAYS made sure they had a bolt hole.

We took advantage of our corner, surrounded by the rest of *Siol Ailpein*, and spread our tents comfortably. There was one reserved for the pipe band, who deserved every bit of it — they played and played and played! Another screened tent was for a well-laid feast of finger foods and potables, a double width was set up for the books, pamphlets, shirts, registers and other impedimenta of both the American Clan and California Chapter. Another

small tent was set aside for Sir Gregor's use, but I never saw him use it. On Sunday when I urged him to come and sit in the shade, he said that if there was one thing to be learned in the Scots Guards, it was to stand. Behind our first line of tents was a big pavilion, complete with Persian rugs, medieval decor and lots of seating. We took on the general appearance of a major encampment. We also took the "Best Clan Tent" award.

The pavilion was provided by Barbara and Ron Johnson the Younger, who are much involved in the Renaissance and Living History groups. There was a big Renaissance Faire the same weekend in nearby Novato and a number of people attended both and wore 16th Century costumes. Ron's *breacon-feile*, great kilt, in the red and black "Rob Roy", surmounted by black velvet and a lot of gold and lace, was a hit with the public. (And apparently the Duke of Argyle, who made a special foray into MacGregor country to get pictures).

We made an impressive array as we were piped before the grandstands in the opening ceremonies Saturday and again on Sunday. As Honor Clan, we were the first on the field, as was fitting — MacGregors have been first on many fields. The Clan Gregor Pipe Band led off, playing The Young MacGregor, a tune specially written for Sir Gregor. They were followed by a well-decorated USN Reservist, Clark Fritze, carrying Sir Gregor's personal pennon. He was followed by Sir Gregor, then his honor guard carrying the national flags and then came what was more than likely more MacGregor tartan than has been seen in one place since the last rebellion. Everyone who could scrounge a scrap of tartan wore it proudly as the rest of the clans trailed in behind us. As of this writing (October) it is still impossible to find anything in any MacGregor sett anywhere in northern California.

Our afternoons both Saturday and Sunday were spent visiting, cementing new friendships, listening to our own pipe band, sitting in the shade, making forays into the hospitality tent, answering questions from the public and potential members, wandering off to watch the weight events, the soccer games, sit in the grandstand, or listen awhile to Alex Beaton while we shopped at the varied booths and shops.

On Saturday, there was much activity in the Redwood Grove behind the tents, where a vast feast was in the making. George and Fran Lee had planned for over a year to host the barbeque, but then George died in January. Fran and her sons, Gerry, Clifford and Ralph, decided to continue with the barbeque as a memorial to George. And a wonderful memorial it was. Helped by family and friends, the Lees did it all. Decked in their "MacGregor Cattle Company (The Choice of the Montrose Herds)" aprons, they fed three hundred thirty-eight people a delicious feast of steak, chicken, salads, baked beans, french bread, and even a decorated cake.

It was a lovely setting for dinner, with the lowering sun filtering through the trees, still warm, but cooling to find-a-sweater. It was a time to relax, have a quiet drink and savor not only the food, but the camaraderie. The Clan Gregor Pipe Band, led by the renowned pin-up Greg O'Brian (you have seen the Kodak poster, haven't you?), once again played for us and for George. Fran still gets misty-eyed whenever she speaks of it.

There was one aspect of Santa Rosa that I'd never thought about before; but once the subject came up, I was/am fascinated. I've always been aware of a family resemblance, but had no idea it seems to extend beyond immediate family into clan. I was not surprised, for instance, to find Bill McGregor resembled a great, great grand uncle, but Abbey Magruder and Sir Gregor? Now I know there are no line ties there, not since before 1774, anyway. And there's Jack Robins, who could be a twin to Burl Ives (his mother was a MacGregor) and they have no known connection. And T. Patrick McGregor is the image of Bill McGregor's father, yet they could find no match in their lines. Is blood thicker than water? Or perhaps genes are thicker than blood?

There were a few flubs, goofs and foul-ups, but none intended or hurtful. It took awhile for the more formal habits of protocol to sink into the uninhibited, informal California minds as we persistently addressed Lady MacGregor as Lady Fanny. Few realizing that only the daughter of a duke is addressed with the title coupled with a first name. Of course, the Renaissance contingent only made matters worse by addressing everyone as ''M'lord and M'lady'' or ''Your Grace'' — except the one time they should have used it. I've no idea what the Duke of Argyle thought, perhaps he is used to the provincials, and like Lady Fanny, forgave us.

Part of me thinks: It was great! I wouldn't change a thing! And then: I wish I had/knew/remembered all the names of everyone who attended, and had arranged for more formal photographs, or even had names to go with the pictures I do have. I wish I had had the time to have talked in depth with everyone there! And I think — NEXT time, put the ice and water outside the tent where everyone can get to it, and get a little help for your overworked regimental bhisti. You know, things like that.

There are a lot of things I will never forget and that even the memory brings on goose-bumps. The sight of Sir Gregor's personal pennon flying at the hotel, in front of the tent, and leading us onto the field; the sound of pipes, and knowing they are "Our Own"; walking behind, and with, so many 'welldecorated' men wearing our own; meeting people who had only been names on a list or voices on the phone, and learning we have more in common than just a name; being with, belonging to, and part of — gives meaning and understanding to — "MacGregor despite them!"

### A VISIT TO CALIFORNIA

### Lady MacGregor of MacGregor

On our last full day in San Francisco, our hostess gave an informal and impromptu barbecue lunch to which she invited Joe and Peg Tichy, Bill and Mary Lou McGregor and Thelma Campbell the widow of our old friend Judge Hugh B. Campbell who was accompanying them to the Gathering. This was a very relaxed party as I'm afraid I was happily engaged in the swimming pool on their arrival while our hostess and Sir Gregor dealt with baby, dog and barbecue simultaneously. However, both proved more than competent and we had a delicious lunch in the sun with the steaks sizzling away! In the evening we attended a most enjoyable cocktail party given by the British Consul and his wife, who were taking a keen interest in the week arranged by the Caledonian Club.

The next day we packed, but not too sadly as we knew that we would be seeing our hosts and baby (but not dog) again in Santa Rosa, and Michael Campbell-Lamerton drove us half way to our next port of call — on our way we attended a small reception with welcoming speeches by the Committee of the Caledonian Club, and then made our way to Santa Rosa — where we had been invited by Sir Gregor's Masonic connections firstly to a dinner there and then were met by Joe Tichy who had gone on ahead to prepare the hotel for the American Clan Gregor Society's Gathering.

It was dark when we arrived at the hotel, and so we were enchanted by the trees ornamented with fairy lights which shone into the darkness like stars — the hotel was called The Doubletree which explains the particular shape and profusion of trees around it. Needless to say, we awoke to a glorious morning and explored our surroundings — these were most attractively laid out surrounding a series of courtyards, but not rising at all high, so it gave a feeling of being entirely on one level. The grounds were not extensive but included a beautiful, clear swimming pool, which I'm afraid I availed myself of at every possible opportunity.

We spent our first day in Santa Rosa settling into our spacious and very comfortable suite. In the evening the outgoing Chieftain of the American Clan Gregor Society gave a cocktail party, followed by dinner, and then the Officials attended a Council Meeting at which your Chief was also present — this was held at such an unusual hour because of the large number of other commitments.

The following morning we set off ostensibly at 9 a.m. to visit two of the vinevards adjacent to Santa Rosa; the first was Korbel which is famous for its champagne, and the second much smaller for the making of white wine. I am afraid that from this distance in time and space I cannot give members any details of the making of champagne – all I can tell you is that there was a large variety of white, pink and red champagnes. We tasted most of them and it was very enjoyable standing on the verandah of the chateau sipping all these delicious concoctions! At Korbel there was also a most amusing small shop where we could get small souvenirs of the vineyard. Later we lunched in the church hall just outside Santa Rosa, and then in the church itself a memorial service was held for those members of the Society who had died during the past year. This was conducted by the Reverend H. N. Richardson (Chaplain to the Society), and during it a single white carnation was placed in a wreath to commemorate each deceased member. We then moved to the large graveyard where the wreath was laid on a tombstone of some MacGregors who had lived and died in Santa Rosa. It was a solemn and moving moment.

After our return to the hotel and dinner we attended the traditional Ceilidh in the hotel, our Pipe Band played beautifully and there were various other events. This Ceilidh was very well attended by the members present, many of whom had children with them and they much enjoyed the Scottish singing and tunes, many of which they knew well.

The final day of the Gathering was, of course, marked by the banquet which is always the highlight of the events. The ladies of the Society as always gave generously of their time decorating the ballroom where the evening was to be celebrated — owing to the sudden illness of the Chairman of the Decorations Committee, many of the plans had sadly gone by default. Peg Tichy had brought many of the decorations with her from North Carolina and despite the mishap a really beautiful and worthy display was arranged. Everyone present, with possibly the exception of some of the smaller children, wore MacGregor Tartan in some form or another and the evening was conducted from the time of the small reception given to start with, throughout, in a marvellous spirit of friendship and cordiality. As the programme would take too long to describe and follows very much the prescribed form of all such functions, I will leave it to members' imagination to visualize the Address to the Haggis, the playing of the Pipe Band, the remarks by the Chief, and finally the installation of the new Chieftain of the American Clan Gregor Society, George F. MacGregor. It was a fairly long evening, but was not over; at the conclusion of the banquet, Joe and Peg Tichy then held a reception in their large suite for apparently all members of the Society who could still manage it! I did not stay very long, but I believe your Chief was there till the early hours of Saturday morning!

The next morning was the start of the Games, one of the real reasons of our visit to California and, driven by Joe and Peg Tichy, we made our way quite early to the site. Fortunately, the parking arrangements were such as to allow Joe to drive right into the ground as the mass of cars arriving would otherwise have made a very long hot walk for us all. The MacGregors had been allocated an excellent position, and we really had 3 tents, two carpeted and covered, with chairs, and the third for refreshments. Sir Gregor and I were received with great cordiality and good humour by the members of the California Chapter who had decorated and arranged the tents for our comfort the arrangements were shared by the American Clan Gregor Society who I believe were responsible for the more commercial side of the enterprise, and who appeared to sell enormous numbers of T-shirts, aprons, carrier bags, etc. At the end of the following day, the Society was awarded the prize for the best organized tents. Certainly Dr. and Mrs. John Robins and their committee were very much to be congratulated on all the arrangements — the only thing that no one could help was, of course, the intense heat, because California certainly lived up to its reputation for weather on those two days!

During the two days at the Games, Sir Gregor and I moved around the ground quite considerably — our tents were actually situated quite some distance from the main attractions. We were very graciously received in the Clan Campbell tent, where a charming lady dispensing soft drinks told me that two years ago they had drunk Malcolm and Ceicilia's health at one of their functions. I was also delighted to find our hosts in San Francisco, the young Campbell-Lamertons, in the crowd. I took them to the MacGregor tent and was permitted to push their baby son Rory in his pram into the tent. He was extremely good under rather trying conditions for someone of 16 months, and enjoyed a great success with everyone.

The highlight however of the two days proceedings was the March of the Clans which took place on the racecourse some distance from the concourse of tents and requiring no little organization to assemble the various Clans with their Chiefs at their head. In view of fact that Clan Gregor was the honoured Clan, our Societies were to march at the head of the procession on one side – the Hays led by the Earl of Erroll led from the other side. In view of the difficulty of reaching the stand for the march I decided to take a party of MacGregor ladies to the grandstand from which we had an excellent view, and we were in the shade! Your Chief made a splendid entrance following the Official American Party playing the National Anthem of America. However, our Pipe Band was not to be outdone and led the MacGregors down the track playing loudly and clearly. The Societies were extremely well-represented by men, women and children all behind their Chief and marching heroically in the blazing sun. Possibly the most moving was the young, blind girl who had married a Mr. Gregg two days previously and came on to the track with her husband on one side and her guide dog on the other. The Campbells, led by His Grace The Duke of Argyll, followed immediately behind — and I am sure members will be pleased to hear that the MacGregors outnumbered the Campbells quite considerably.

I cannot leave the description of the Games without a tribute to Mrs. Lee and her family of the California Chapter who organized a splendid barbecue on the first evening of the Games. Sadly, Mrs. Lee's husband who had originally thought of the barbecue had died very suddenly, but Mrs. Lee was quite determined to carry out his wishes in the matter, and with her family cooked hundreds of pieces of chicken, mixed a great many salads, and cut through many square feet of delicious cake. It was very much cooler sitting out eating this wonderful meal and it made a fitting end to the first day of the Games. Mrs. Lee told us that they had fed 260 people that evening, a truly remarkable achievement.

The Games ended on Sunday evening and on Monday morning most of our friends departed for their homes all over California and the United States. We, however, were not without one final expedition. One of the members of the California Chapter had arranged with Joe Tichy to take us up to his chalet in the woods near Santa Rosa. The chalets form part of a club from San Francisco and such is the membership that admittance (particularly for women) is extremely difficult. However, it was arranged and we made our way to this curious entrance in the forest without difficulty and were taken up to Dr. Dado's cabin and then given a guided tour of the vicinity. It is difficult to describe the enchantment of these woods or the activities which take place there - a huge theatre had been created, there were dining rooms all outside for the members, and a huge expanse on the bank of Russian River set aside for water sports of all kinds. And everything was quite hidden by the density of the trees through which the sun just glinted. We had lunch in Dr. Dado's cabin which seemed a million miles away from civilization - then back to Santa Rosa and a final quiet evening with Joe and Peg Tichy.

The following morning we flew from Santa Rosa to San Francisco and changed aeroplanes there — then we were gone from this magic land and crossing other terrain equally mysterious and some of it appearing almost uninhabited so vast is the mid-west of America — to Toronto that night and on to Newfoundland the following day where we undertook various Masonic engagements. We returned to Edinburgh on Thursday 13th September, having enjoyed a truly magnificent visit and enjoyed deeply the reunion with many old friends, and the making of many new ones.

### THEY'VE CROSSED THE ANTARCTIC CIRCLE

Margery and Ray Richardson made a timely trip to Antarctica recently. Since their return, National Wildlife Magazine and a television special have featured that area and the Arctic as the Earth's last frontier.

Not only was Margery in on "what's happening", globally, but the trip also confirmed her status as a true "World Traveler". She began her travels at age fourteen when her family took her to Canada. She grew up in Cumberland, Maryland, which she calls hillbilly country. Ray verifies this by claiming she has one leg shorter than the other. During College she made the traditional tour of Europe. While at Wellesley College she heard Admiral Richard Byrd speak. She knew then that someday she wanted to see the Antarctic.

Down through the years she managed to touch base with all the continents of the world except Antarctica, but this year she finally got her chance.

The Richardsons were on the National Geographic's last voyage of the year to the Antarctic. They boarded the boat in Argentina and had among its well-traveled passengers three people in their nineties and fourteen in their eighties. The Society said that they had never had such an elderly group, and were at a loss to explain it.

It took two days to cross the Drake Passage below South America and when they crossed the Antarctic Circle the passengers toasted each other with champagne. The Richardsons became members of an elite club. Only one person in a million on the earth has crossed the Antarctic Circle.

Travel through the 30 foot waves in the Drake Passage was very taxing. At one point Margery had to crawl on the floor to get across the cabin. In spite of the treacherous weather, neither one of them missed a meal.

The boat made fourteen stops on the continent and in each case the Richardsons went ashore in rubber rafts, called Zodiacs.

"When I set foot on Antarctica, it made my seventh continent. I was so excited!" she exclaimed.

While ashore they walked about and watched the activities, both natural and manmade. They saw numerous kinds of birds, five kinds of seals and three kinds of penguins. There are 35 million seals there and 65 million penguins.

They noted that after two weeks of the extremely white glacial terrain they felt as if they had been to outer space and back. It was actually a shock to see trees again on the return voyage.

The most striking memory of the trip was the absolute silence which pervaded the continent. The only sound to be heard was people talking or hearing an iceberg calf.

It was a thrilling experience, and it's quite possible our good Chaplain issued a prayer of thanksgiving upon their safe return to their home on the Eastern Shore of Maryland.



### ANGEL MUNCASTER

Tom and Jean Muncaster of Charlottesville, Virginia are bursting with pride over the swimming feats of their daughter, Angel.

Angel won the 200 meter freestyle race and excelled in eight other events to lead the Charlottesville Area Swim Team to a seventh place finish in the YMCA National Swim Meet at Ann Arbor, Michigan last August.

The rising junior at Charlottesville High School was named Athlete of the Week by the Charlottesville Observer.

Angel's eighth trip to the Nationals was her best. She won the 200 meter freestyle, finished second in the 200 individual medley, and was in the top three in the 200 and 400 races of the individual medley and the 200 and 400 races of the medley relay.

## HOW TO MAKE A BREACAN-FEILE by Pauline Johnson

There are a number of books, The Scottish Clans & Their Tartans, The Tartans of the Clans and Families of Scotland, etc., which tell you about the *breacan-feile*, the belted plaid or great kilt. For instance, to quote Innes of Learney:


"The *breacan-feile* was a combination of kilt and plaid, and consisted of twelve ells of tartan (six ells of double tartan) neatly plaited and fastened around the body with a belt. The lower part formed the kilt, while the other half, being fixed to the shoulder by a brooch, hung down behind and thus formed the plaid. It was possible to display considerable skill and neatness in arranging the plaits, so as to show the sett of the pattern."

But none of them tell you HOW to make it or put it on. Fortunately, we had opportunity to chat with a gentleman at the Santa Rosa Games, who gave a graphic enough description, easily followed. By the way, an ell is 37.2 inches.

"On a good length of bare floor or ground, lay ye down a good wide belt as fits ye properly. Lay atop ye belt one end of twelve ells of tartan, longways. If ye be a man of better proportion, then ye may need more. The tartan must be laid out full, straight and even, else ye pleats be fouled. With care fold in good deep pleats in ye tartan until ye have enough to fit around ye middle, and fills ye belt. This should be all but half ye tartan. Then, wearing naught but ye shirte, lay ye down on ye tartan, grasping ye belt buckle in ye left hand. Hold fast ye buckle and roll over until ye buckle and belt end meet. Ye may now stand with care, and fasten ye belt firmly.

The hanging down behind portion of ye tartan is then gathered at the long loose end and brought over ye shoulder and pinned with a good great plaid brooch. Now ye may wrap ye plaid about the shoulders, to keep warm in bad weather or let it hang down behind in good. Or, if ye be fortunate, ye may lend that portion to a fair lass who may feel chill from ye foggy, foggy dew."

Which is why it is called a "great kilt".
