

## AMERICAN CLAN GREGOR SOCIETY, INC. COUNCIL MEETING — OCTOBER 15, 1999

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor called the meeting to order on October 15, 1999 at 8:40 a.m. The invocation was given by Thaddeus Osborne.

Chieftain MacGregor welcomed and introduced three new members to the ACGS Council. The Chieftain also announced the resignation of two Society officers. After years of faithful and fruitful service, Helen Garrett and Mason Lummis will retire and Tess James has agreed to be nominated for Society Historian and Marshall Grier has agreed to be nominated for Society Librarian.

The meeting continued by referencing the minutes of the 1998 Council Meeting as recorded by Scribe Jeffrey McGregor and printed in the last yearbook. A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes as recorded in the yearbook. Motion carried.

The Treasurer, Robert MacGregor, distributed copies of his report and summarized the report for the Council. The Treasurer's report was approved as presented.

The Registrar, Millie Gregg, presented her report to the Council, which was approved as presented. Millie also briefed the Council on how well the new membership application process is working, utilizing a computer system. She also reported progress on the on-going "cross-reference" project.

Tess James, Historian-Elect, presented the Historian report to the Council, which was approved as presented.

Lillian Magruder, Yearbook Editor, presented her report to the Council, which was approved as presented.

Marshall Grier, Librarian-Elect, presented the Librarian's report to the Council, which was approved as presented.

The Board of Trustees has not met and no report was presented to the Council.

Hallam Walker gave the Council the Scholarship report. Hallam gave a brief explanation of the Blunt Scholarship Fund and reported on the award of four scholarships.

The Assistant Chieftain, Joe Tichy, gave his report to the Council.

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor asked John Bellassai, Society Chancellor, for his follow-up report on overseas issues. John briefed the Council on a number of issues.

Newsletter Editor Ron McGregor gave his report to the Council. Ron also announced that the next issue of the Society Newsletter would be in December 1999.

Bob Wren, Chairman of the Gathering Site & Development Committee, gave his report to the Council and announced the committee's recommendations for Gathering site selections for 2000 and 2001. Bob also briefed the Council on a possible site for the 2002 Gathering. Past Chieftain Abbey Magruder also made some suggestions on future Gathering sites.

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor announced he would reserve his remarks until the General Meeting.

Under Unfinished Business, a report of the By-Laws Committee was presented by its chairman, John Bellassai. John distributed copies of the Committee's report, consisting of seven recommendations. After John briefed the Council on the Committee's report, a motion was made to table consideration of these recommendations until the Council meeting next year. The motion was seconded. Under discussion, Chieftain MacGregor reminded those present that ten Council member signatures should accompany this report in order that it be added to the next Council meeting agenda. Motion carried. Malcolm thanked John and the Committee members for a job well done. John requested that all seven recommendations of the Committee be entered into the record and the Chieftain agreed this would be done. Scribe McGregor then read each Committee recommendation heading into the record as follows: Recommendation #1 - Article III, Section III, Associate Members, should be revised by deleting the last two sentences...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here) and Add a new Section IV to Article III, entitled, Honorary Members...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here). Renumber those sections of Article III beginning with the current Section VI...(additional text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #2 - Article III, Section IV, Life Members, should be amended to delete the following phrase from line three of the text...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #3 - Article VI, Officers, Section VII, Registrar, should be amended to add a new last sentence...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #4 - Article VI, Officers, Section VIII, Treasurer, Subsection a, Duties, should be amended to read...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here), Article VI, Section VIII, Subsection b, Auditing the Treasurer's Accounts, should be amended to...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #5 - Amend Article VI, Section IX, Chancellor, to add...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #6 - Article III, Eligibility and Classification of Members, Section VI, Application for Membership, Subsection b, Processing Applications, should be amended and expanded as...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here), Add to end of Section VI, Subsection b the following new text...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here); Recommendation #7 - Article VIII, Other Committees, Section I, Identification of Committees, should be amended to add...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here), Article VIII, Section II, Editorial Committee, Subsection a, Membership, should be amended and expanded to include...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here), Article VIII should be amended and expanded to include a new Section IV, entitled Bylaws Revision Committee, to read...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here), Article VIII should be further amended and expanded to include a new Section V, entitled Publicity Committee, to read...(additional detailed text also presented but not reproduced here).

Ron McGregor raised the question about the Clan Gregor involvement in the ceremony of the new Scottish parliament. Malcolm asked Chief Gregor if he would like to speak on this and the Chief did give his thoughts and advice on this subject.

Under New Business, Jim McGregor made a motion that in view of the years of loyal service, Dr. William C. Stoke be conferred the title of ACGS Piper Emeritus and be made an Honorary Life Member of this Society. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Chieftain MacGregor called for any nominations from the floor for a new ACGS Piper. A motion was made that the Nominating Committee add Pipe Major J. Gregory O'Brien as this Society's official Piper. Motion carried unanimously.

Past Chieftain Paul Gregg made a motion that Newsletter Editor Ron McGregor be praised by the Council for his dedication and success in keeping our fine Society Newsletter coming out on a regular basis. Motion was seconded, carried unanimously and was followed by an enthusiastic round of applause.

Past Chieftain Paul Gregg presented the Nominating Committee's slate of new officers for the coming year. The Council approved the slate for presentation and vote at the general membership meeting on Saturday, October 16, 1999.

Paul Gregg also presented the nomination for the composition of the next Nominating Committee. The slate presented was Capt. Paul C. Gregg, Joseph C. Tichy, and Robert F. MacGregor. The Council approved this slate by a unanimous vote.

With the concurrence of the Council, Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor appointed Joe Tichy as Assistant Chieftain and Carrington Ewell as Deputy Assistant Chieftain.

With no further business coming before the Council, a motion was made, and seconded, to adjourn. Motion carried and the Council adjourned their meeting at 9:40 a.m.

## AMERICAN CLAN GREGOR SOCIETY GENERAL MEETING — OCTOBER 16, 1999

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor called the 90th meeting of the Amercian Clan Gregor Society to order on October 16, 1999 at 9:00 a.m. Malcolm began by introducing our honored guests, Sir Gregor MacGregor of MacGregor and his wife Fanny. Following a round of applause from the audience, Sir Gregor extended his thanks and warm wishes from the Clan Gregor Society of Scotland. After Sir Gregor's opening remarks, Thaddeus Osborne gave the invocation.

The meeting began with the reading of the Minutes of the 1999 Council Meeting by Scribe Jeffrey McGregor. A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes as read. Motion carried. A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes of the 1998 General Meeting as recorded in the yearbook. Motion carried.

Treasurer Sandy MacGregor gave the Treasurer's report. All reports are believed to be accurate. Sandy reported total ordinary income of \$36,268.00, total interest/dividends of \$15,564.47, total income of \$51,832.47 and total expenses of \$42,867.47, leaving a positive cash flow difference of \$8,956.00. Sandy reported no extra ordinary expenses this year. Annual dues received for 1998/99 totaled \$9,150.00. Sandy reported that this year we are showing an unrealized profit of \$13,029.32 on our investments. Sandy reported that this year our net worth is \$216,581.47, versus \$226,014.19 for last year. This is a decrease of \$9,432.72, of which \$29,266.31 is in the unrealized decrease in the value of the stocks. Sandy offered copies of his report to anyone present. The Treasurer's report was accepted as presented.

Registrar Millie Gregg reported the acceptance of 48 new members into the Society this year. Millie also reported four members have converted to Life Membership, two reinstated members, and eleven new junior members. Millie emphasized the importance of encouraging our youth to join our Society. Millie read aloud to the audience the names of all the new members and asked them to stand and be recognized and welcomed. The new members were welcomed with an enthusiastic round of applause. The Registrar's report was accepted as presented.

Historian-Elect Tess James presented the Historian's report. Tess read aloud to the audience the names of nine who have passed away this year. Tess encouraged all those present to please pass along any historical information to her as soon as it is possible.

Yearbook Editor Lillian Magruder gave her report and asked the audience to please send pictures and articles for the yearbook directly to her no later than February 29, 2000. Lillian reminded the audience that she is the editor of the yearbook, not the writer. She emphasized that the yearbook will be much more interesting to everyone if members participate by submitting articles and photos. Lillian also reminded members to write the identity of subjects in all submitted photos and a return envelope if you want your photos returned. The Yearbook Editor's report was accepted as presented.

Librarian-Elect Marshall Grier gave the Librarian's report. Marshall reported that our library program is progressing very nicely. The Librarian's report was accepted as presented.

Hallam Walker gave the report of the Board of Trustees. Hallam reported the Board supervises the finances of the Society and as you heard from our Treasurer Sandy MacGregor, our Society is in good shape. The Board of Trustees report was accepted as presented. Hallam also reported on the awards given by the Scholarship Committee of the Harry & Edith Blunt Scholarship Fund. This year, scholarships were awarded to Bethany Dunham, Gilmore McGregor, Amy McGregor, and John Covan. Hallam reported that each one of these students was awarded \$463.00 by the Committee. Hallam encouraged all interested Society members to make application for a scholarship. Malcolm thanked Hallam for his report and the fine job that the committee is doing.

Joe Tichy opened his Assistant Chieftain's report with the announcement that our membership roll has grown now to 703 members. Joe also reported that we have over 300 members attending the Annual Gathering this year. Joe reported that Bill Stoke has been named Piper Emeritus due to ill health. Joe also announced that he would like to publicly thank Manager of Merchandise Sales John Greer and his wife Lillian, who have done a wonderful job over the years in coordinating the sale of Society merchandise. The audience responded with an enthusiastic round of applause. Joe also announced that Thaddeus Osborne has agreed to become our new Merchandise Sales Manager. Joe welcomed Marshall Grier as our new Librarian and reported that Mason Lummis will continue to supervise the storage of a collection of all the past Society yearbooks for us. The audience gave Mason Lummis an appreciative round of applause for his years of service. Joe reported that our Society has recently acquired a magnificent copy of the "Black Book of Tamus". Joe explained to the audience the significance of this book to our Society and stated it will be housed in our library in Baltimore. Joe also thanked Scribe Jeffrey McGregor for the fine job he has done during his years of service. The Assistant Chieftain's report was accepted as presented.

Joe then asked Sir Gregor's wife, Fanny, to come to the podium and read a letter of thanks that our Society received from her son and his new bride for the wedding gift presented to them on our behalf by Helen Garrett. Fanny read this wonderful letter, which the audience enjoyed immensely.

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor then asked Richard Gregg to come forward for a special presentation to Sir Gregor. Richard gave a brief presentation on his research and publication of a book on Gregor MacGregor, Cazique of Poyais, 1786 - 1845. Richard presented a copy of this book to Sir Gregor. Sir Gregor was pleased to accept this gift and shared a very interesting story with the audience, which related to this Gregor MacGregor of the 1800's.

Chieftain Malcolm MacGregor began his address to the audience by briefly reviewing how far our Society has come since 1909. Malcolm reminded the audience that we now have Deputy Chieftains in 23 states and members in 49 states. Malcolm stated that he believes that we must arrange to make a substantial, ongoing, annual contribution to the Clan Gregor Society of Scotland to help support preservation, cataloging, restoring and maintaining of MacGregor artifacts in Scotland. Malcolm announced that he would make a motion to this effect at next year's Council Meeting. Malcolm also announced that he would soon appoint a committee whose job it will be to ascertain the needs and desires to meet this end. This committee will report to the Council next year with their findings. Malcolm encouraged the audience to communicate with their respective Deputy Chieftains to let them know how they feel about this proposal. Malcolm thanked Helen Garrett for her 13 years of dedicated service to our Society. The audience also showed their appreciation with a warm round of applause.

The Chieftain called for Unfinished Business, and hearing none, he moved on to New Business.



The Chieftain called for any New Business. Ron McGregor asked to be recognized. Ron apologized to Tess James for not getting information on a Colorado Scottish wedding to her sooner. Ron shared the information with the audience. Ron also announced that Colorado has a new "Miss Colorado" who is a MacGregor. Ron also briefed the audience on four Games in Colorado in which MacGregors were represented. He also mentioned that at one of the Colorado Games, and for the first time ever, Clan Gregor swept all of the awards at the Games.

John Bellassai asked that the audience be briefed on what the Clan Gregor Society in Scotland might use the money for, if supported. Malcolm asked John to come forward and share this with the audience. John spoke of one project that he is familiar with - the on-going project to unearth and preserve certain stones in Dalmally Kirkyard. John stated that there is good reason to believe (and research supports this) that these are carved funeral stones from the late 13th and early 14th century of some of the earliest known MacGregor Chiefs. John felt this would be a very appropriate project for our Society to support.



The Chieftain then asked past Chieftain Paul Gregg to present the Nominating Committee's slate of officers for election. Paul read as follows: Chieftain - Malcolm G. MacGregor; Ranking Deputy Chieftain - Jeffrey R. McGregor; Scribe - John C. McGregor; Registrar - Millie Gregg; Historian - Tess James; Treasurer - Robert F. MacGregor; Surgeon - Dr. Thomas M. McNish; Chancellor - Abbey W. Magruder; Librarian - Marshall V. Grier; Yearbook Editor - Lillian Magruder; and Piper - J. Gregory O'Brien. For election to the Board of Trustees: E. Magruder Passano, Hallam Walker and Carrington W. Ewell. The Chieftain then called for any nominations from the floor. Hearing none, a motion from the floor was made to approve this entire slate of officers and the motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Malcolm commented that he thanked everyone for the nomination to serve again for another year, and he is proud to be the Chieftain, but that it was a bittersweet moment because he would much rather that his good and great friend Rob Roy MacGregor was here to accept the position.

The Chieftain then made a series of announcements concerning various functions which would take place on this day, including the Deputy Chieftain meeting.

### CAPTAIN HOWARD TROUTMAN BIERER 1912 - 1998



Captain Howard T. "Pat" Bierer, (SC) USN (Ret.), 86, Clan No. 1975A, a longtime resident of Williamsburg, Virginia, died on December 31, 1998.

The youngest son of a Navy family and a 1933 graduate of the US Naval Academy, his father, Capt. Bion B., and brothers Capt. Bion B. Jr. and Capt. James S. all were Naval Academy graduates.

Captain Bierer spent 27 years in the Navy Supply Corps, retiring in 1960 as Officer in Charge at Cheatham Annex near Williamsburg, Virginia. In 1944 he helped in fitting-out the *USS Supply* and also served on board as Supply Officer. In 1947 he was attached to The American Mission for Aid to Greece as Assistant Attache and awarded the "Order of George 1 of Greece" for his activities in this mission.

With his wife Lib, Pat spent his retirement years designing and building their "dream" house, an

authentic 18th Century home overlooking Queen's Lake in Williamsburg. He was a member of Bruton Parish Church beginning in 1959 and a former member of St. Albans Church in Washington, DC, where he and his wife of 48 years were married and their daughter Bessie was christened.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth "Lib" Lynn Bierer, Clan No. 1856, and a daughter, Bessie Roberts Bierer Chamness. A memorial service was held at Bruton Parish Church, Williamsburg, Virginia, on January 12, 1999. Captain Bierer was buried near other family members at Arlington National Cemetery on January 19, 1999.

## LLOYD BURNS MAGRUDER, JR. 1917 - 1999



Lloyd Burns Magruder, Jr. died unexpectedly on January 14, 1999, at Cape Cod Hospital, Hyannis, Massachusetts. He was 81 years old. He was born on July 8, 1917 in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Burns attended Kent School in Kent, Connecticut, and graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1939 and received a Master's Degree in Chemical Engineering in 1940.

After a short period of employment at Esso Laboratories, he was called to active duty, serving with the U.S. Army Ordinance Department at Aberdeen Proving Ground, MD; Detroit,

MI and Europe in technical and intelligence work. He was discharged in 1945 as a lieutenant colonel. He continued in the Army Reserves, serving as an instructor and then as commandant of the Wilmington, DE U.S. Army Reserve School. He retired as colonel in 1968.

From 1945 until his retirement in 1982, he was employed by the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Co. as a project engineer in the Design Division of the Central Engineering Department. He served as an internal consultant on chemical plant design and became an expert on pressure relief systems, contributing to DuPont's outstanding reputation for safety. He and his family lived in Wilmington, Delaware from 1962 to 1982.

He was an active gardener, supporter of land conservation efforts on the Cape, and a member of the Massachusetts Audubon Society, Barnstable Land Trust and the Compact of Cape Cod Conservation Trusts. He played tennis three times a week until the day before his death.

Burns was a member and past Chieftain of American Clan Gregor Society and he and Beatrice chaired the committee for two Gatherings held in Wilmington, Delaware. It was a rare Gathering that he and Beatrice missed.

Surviving him are his wife, Beatrice Lowell Magruder; a son Samuel H. S. Magruder; two daughters, M. Blue Magruder-Hurwitch and Sarah Beall Magruder-Wardman; and four grand-children.



#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1999 GATHERING

October 14-16, 1999 Williamsburg, Virginia by Ron McGregor

The Annual Gathering of the American Clan Gregor Society was held at the beautiful Fort Magruder Inn in historic Williamsburg, Virginia in mid-October. The hotel is built on the site of the hastily constructed earthern fort built and commanded by General Magruder of the Confederate Army. Descendants of General Magruder are members of our Society today. Of the more than three hundred attending this annual event, my son and I were the only two from Colorado. Beginning with a Reception on Thursday evening and finishing with a party lasting into the wee hours following Saturday night's Banquet, the Gathering was filled with interesting activities.

Friday morning the Council met while registration continued and new arrivals had the chance to meet old friends and get acquainted with new comers to the Society. Seeing so many people sporting their MacGregor tartans was quite a sight and even though another group was holding a reunion at the hotel at the same time, we were the proud Scots. The glad handing, hugging and back patting continued right through the tasty luncheon laid on by the hotel. Afterwards we loaded onto busses to take us to the historic Bruton Parish Church for our very moving Memorial Service. The church was built 1710-1715 and is still lighted by candles. Great men were nurtured in this church, taught by its clergy, and educated at the college of William and Mary. Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Marshall and other famous Virginians worshipped here.

After the memorial we were taken on a tour of the replica of Jamestown. This is a living museum with the people dressed in period costumes and working in the trades of the time. You could stop and visit with them and receive a most interesting education. Most surprising to my son and myself was the extremely small sizes of the three ships on which the pilgrims sailed from England. One was so small I would hesitate to sail it on our own Grand Lake - and it carried nineteen pilgrims to the "new world".

That evening we had our annual "Ceilidh", a somewhat informal party with entertainment. One of our performers for the Ceilidh was a lovely young lady by the name of Lindsay Ann Burnett. Lindsay is a freshman at William and Mary College and the daughter of one of our Society members. She sang several songs acappella. Lindsay is a very accomplished singer and a delightful young lady that our Clan can be proud to call "one of ours". Lindsay was followed by a local group of young men who perform under the name "The Virginia Company" and specialize in folk songs. They were fun to listen to and were enjoyed by all. Then came the moment we had all been waiting for as our very own "Pipes and Drums of the American Clan Gregor Society" marched in along with our dancers. We always look forward to seeing our three regular dancers and members of our band. Gregg O'Brien, Pipe

Major of the band, is an Honorary Member of the Society and this year was appointed to the position of Society's Piper - a position usually held by a Society Lineal Member.

On Saturday morning we held our Annual General Membership meeting, followed by a meeting of the State Deputy Chieftains. Following another delightful luncheon Millie Gregg, the Society's Registrar, hosted what has become an annual event - a Genealogy Seminar. Afterwards we again boarded busses to take us to Merchants Square in downtown Colonial Williamsburg for a short parade and concert. The parade consisted of our Pipes and Drums, followed by the members of the Society and their families proudly wearing our Clan tartans. The mid-afternoon parade (with prior authorization, as compared to our now famous impromptu evening parade along the River Walk in San Antonio back in 1997) attracted a lot of attention and was followed by a concert by our Pipes and Drums and dancers that drew hundreds of spectators. While our pipers played, many members of Clan Gregor were approached by people from the gathering crowd to answer questions and pose for photos.



The reception was followed by our Annual Banquet, at which our hereditary Chief, Brigadier Sir Gregor MacGregor of MacGregor, Bt. gave a very moving address to the Society. My son Scott was honored by being selected to be one of the two honor guards for the "Address to the Haggis" ceremony. We were entertained again by our Pipes and Drums dressed to their nines in their white tunics and tall feathered hats. And our Gathering would not be complete without a performance by our venerable troubadour John Masterson.

Sir Gregor and Lady Fanny were our honored guests for this our 90th Annual Gathering, and were kind enough to pose for probably over a hundred photos either alone or with members of the Society. Sir Gregor assumed the position of Chief of the Clan Gregor upon the death of his father Malcolm in 1958, and he and Lady Fanny attended their first ACGS Gathering as Chief the following year. In 1990 Sir Gregor joined us at our Annual Gathering which was held in conjunction with the famous Santa Rosa, California Highland Games. Clan Gregor was the "Honored Clan" at those games and as such our own Pipes and Drums led us onto the field at the opening ceremonies as the announcer shouted over the PA system, "Ladies and Gentlemen...here come the MacGregors." The thousands of spectators in the stands stood and cheered. Behind us came the Campbells (did I mention they had to follow us?), and all of the other clans. It was a thrilling moment for our Clan. Oh, and did I mention that the Campbells came onto the field after the MacGregors?



### REPORTS OF STATE DEPUTY CHIEFTAINS 1999 Annual Report for Arkansas

The events of Clan Gregor in and around Arkansas are too numerous to include them all, so here are some highlights I am personally aware of.

In November 1998 The MacGregors made a grand showing at the first Mid-America Celtic Festival and Scottish Games in Hot Springs, Arkansas. We had about 25 at the Ceilidh on Saturday night. This year the Mid-America Celtic Festival and Scottish Games will be November 5-6. This will be the AGM for Clan MacGregor of the South Central United States. Most of the officers of the CMSCUS (come see us) are members of ACGS also.

Arkansas has three Scottish Festivals or Games; The Ozark Highland Games was at Arkansas College originally and is now at Lyons College in Batesville, Arkansas (21 years old); the Borders Games are in Ft. Smith, Arkansas (3 years old); and the Mid-America Celtic Festival and Scottish Games is in Hot Springs, Arkansas (1 year old).

In the early part of 1999 I was active with Clan McGregor (1st Ark. Inf. Co. "D" C.S.A.), our reenactment unit at several memorial services. In addition to myself, we have two other MacGregors, Pvt. Michael Gordon Greggson and Corpl. Chris McGehee. Although most in the unit are not of MacGregor descent, they are all aware of the MacGregor heritage. Some even wear pine, the MacGregor plant badge, in their kepies or hats when we reenact.

The Clan Gregor tent in April at Ozark Games was very active and we had many visitors. The pipe band director at Lyon College is Will Muirhead from Scotland, and his ancestors were MacGregors from the Black Isle.

In June I attended, along with other ACGS members, the Glasgow Highland Games at Glasgow, Kentucky. We were the honored clan and the ACGS pipe band was there also.

rian Church. Gene Cole must be commended for the efforts as the VP of the Memphis Scottish Society and ACGS's West Tennessee Deputy Clan Chieftain.

Gene and I plan to attend the Heart of Tennessee Scottish Games in Murphfreesboro, Tennessee on October 2, 1999. The Tennessee tartan will be introduced at these games. Gene and I will also be in attendance at the Clan Gathering in Williamsburg, Virginia.

I am researching the McGregors of Rutherford County, Tennessee in the early 1800s and would be interested in hearing from any of their descendants. In July we had our ACGS tent at the Pikes Peak Highland Games. These Games were held at a new location this year and it would be difficult to think of a more beautiful site. The Games were held at the Air Force Academy, located just north of Colorado Springs. We enjoyed seeing old friends and meeting several new ones. We had thirty-eight Clan Gregor types visit our tent, including a family of McGregors vacationing from the Isle of Man.

Bob McGregor of Colorado Springs and President of the Scottish Games Association of the US visited the tent and gave us a gift of a color photo of our past Hereditary Chief Sir Malcolm MacGregor of MacGregor. The photo was taken of Sir Malcolm sitting in the trophy room of the then seat of the MacGregors at Edinchip at Lochearnhead, Perthshire. The photo is circa 1954 and depicts Sir Malcolm wearing a kilt of the Rob Roy tartan and holding a broadsword..."swung by a MacGregor battling under Prince Charlie"...during the '45' rising. The photo depicts portraits of several of Sir Malcolm's progenitors, as well as family and Clan heirlooms. We are most grateful to Bob for the throughtful gift, which will be on display at the Clan Gregor tent at future Scottish Games.

The 36th annual Colorado Scottish Festival was held at Highlands Ranch just south of Denver on August 14-15. The Colorado members of the ACGS again sponsored the trophy for the winner of the Outstanding Novice in Highland Dance. This year's winner was twelve year old Laura Venable, daughter of Pat and Bill Venable of Piedmont, Oklahoma. We had an estimated 18,000 visitors to this year's Games. We had fifty-five Clan Gregor types visit our ACGS tent. The highlight of each of these Games is the noontime ceremony consisting of the March of the Clans, after which we return to the Clan Gregor tent for light refreshments. This year we had an added attraction at the Clan Gregor tent when Michelle Huber, a young Clan Gregor lady, graced us with a lively performance with the fiddle.

The 23rd annual Long Peak Highland Festival was held September 10-11 in the beautiful mountain resort of Estes Park. Visitors driving the main road from Lyons, Colorado travel much of the way over the route of the original road between Lyons and Estes Park built by Alexander MacGregor in 1875, one of the earliest ranchers in the park. As you drop over the last mountain leading into Estes, you see the town lying in the valley below and directly

beyond is the imposing MacGregor Mountain. And at the base of MacGregor Mountain is the MacGregor Ranch homesteaded in 1862 along the Black Canyon Creek, which was donated by Muriel L. MacGregor in 1983 as a charitable trust and living museum; and remains a working cattle ranch within the boundaries of Rocky Mountain National Park.

In addition to the noon-time ceremonies at the Games which includes the March of the Clans, the city of Estes Park has a parade through the town on Saturday morning prior to the start of the Games that day. The parade includes the bands, clans, athletes, dancers, canine, floats, military units, etc. The Clans are judged in the parade with points earned for Clan Banner, Parade Presentation (some semblance of marching order and interaction with crowd), Dress (wearing kilts, kilt skirts, or some bit of tartan), and number of clan members participating. In 1993 Clan Gregor won the "Best in Parade" trophy.

These games also award a trophy for the "Best Clan Tent" of the Games, which is judged by a second set of judges. Points are earned on presentation of clan history/heritage, genealogy assistance, displays of crests, tartans, etc. In 1992 Clan Gregor won the "Best Clan Tent" award. This year we had ninety-six Clan Gregor types visit our ACGS tent.

The highest award a clan can receive is the "Best Clan of the Festival" award, which is based on a combination of performance in the city parade, clan tent displays, participation in the two noon-time ceremonies, knowledge of clan history and oral presentations. I am very proud to announce that this year, with between 50,000 - 60,000 attendees and with 73 clans participating, Clan Gregor won the "Best in Parade" trophy, "Best Clan Tent" trophy, and "Best Clan of the Festival" trophy. According to the Clans committee, this has happened only one other time several years ago and that was by a clan that was holding their annual general membership meeting in conjunction with the Games.

The 4th annual celebration of these games were held in the far west region of the state on September 25th. This was the first year the ACGS tent was present at these Games and proved to be of service to our kinsmen on the west slope of the state. This year we had twenty-seven Clan Gregor types visit our ACGS tent. We have an industrious and able young Clan Gregor couple there working very hard to develop these Games. These Games show much promise.

October finds me supporting the Annual ACGS Gathering and in December I will be putting another issue of "Ardchoille" to bed. I am about halfway towards completion of the booklet "A MacGregor's Guide to Scotland".

### **1999 Annual Report for Delaware** submitted by B. MacGregor Daland

This year getting started was hampered by two somewhat minor problems. First off, I found that the Delco Games in Delaware County, Pennsylvania were canceled again. I had planned to put up a tent for that, because the last time I had been there many MacGregors had asked about clans societies and clan information. At the time I was not a member of ACGS. Games day started out with temperature at 45 degrees, windy and chilly, but by 11:00 a.m. the sun shone and we were blessed with a magnificent day and a huge turnout. ### 1999 Annual Report for Michigan

l worked in the Clan Tent at the Alma Highland Games on May 29 and also the Saline Celtic Festival on July 10.

Alma is the first for the season in Michigan and everyone has a high for the Scottish flavor. Lots of interest in every aspect and particularly people tracing their Scottish heritage.

The Saline Festival is growing every year in attendance. Reporting an article from the Ann Arbor News about it on July 11:

"The announcer proclaimed: There are only two kinds of people in this world. Them that are Scots and them that would like to be,"

And nobody objected, not at the Fourth Annual Saline Celtic Festival.

About 10,000 people converged Saturday on hundreds of acres of grass at Mill Pond Park to savor a great Highland tradition. They watched the reenactment of medieval sword fights between armored warriors, rooted for muscular men throwing an 18-pound stone or flipping a caber - that's a wooden pole 20 feet long, weighing 125 pounds. Or they could listen to the drone of bagpipes, marvel at the agility of a border collie herding sheep, munch on Polish kielbasa or hum along with a Celtic band from Toronto.

I like it. It's a great place to bring kids, said Eugenia Buvnette, 21, who moved to Michigan from Utah a few years ago. She and her husband Ken were sitting under a tree eating nachos with their two children, Katie (2) and Dyllon (4 months).

Walter McNeil, 36, owner of Mac's Acadian Seafood Shack in Saline, said the Saline festival is different from other affairs, such as Ann Arbor Art Fairs, because it is small and specialized.

John Thunder, 72, of Royal Oak, is a drummer for the Celtic Pipes and Drums of Birmingham, one of five bagpipe groups performing Saturday. A native of Great Britain, he emigrated to the United States in 1949 at age 23 and has never lost touch with the pomp and circumstance of the musical tradition of his homeland.

"I was talked into it by the drum major," said the retired advertising designer of his involvement with the 36-member band for the past 17 years. In addition to participating in parades and fairs, his group also performs at weddings and banquets.

Pinckney elementary schoolteacher Kevin Galbraith doesn't normally wear in his class what he did Saturday - a green plaid skirt more correctly known as a kilt. But his class would have been proud of what he did - throw a 16-pound stone 40 feet.

Galbraith, 35, sporting the tartan of the 17th century Highlands clan known as the "wild and lawless bunch", was among a dozen participants in Highland athletic events. They included the stone throw, sheaf toss (instead of hay, nylon rope was used), the caber toss and frozen haggis hurling.

A haggis is a kind of pudding made of the heart, liver and lungs of a sheep or calf, minced with suet, onion and oatmeal, boiled in the stomach of the animal. Legend has it that Highland wives would throw a meal across the stream to where their husbands were working to spare them the trouble of crossing the water for lunch.

An amateur competitor in Highland sporting events, Galbraith prepares for events such as do modern-day athletes, including regular weight lifting. But events such as the stone throw or caber toss require more focus and adaptability because their implements are not standardized like today's shot put.

For the Saline community, the festival is a rallying point for everyone from the Girl Scouts to the Kiwanis Club, according to Steve Chapin, one of 350 volunteers working various details. Everybody in the community gets involved. And the community feels good about it.

The festival was started in 1996 after years of talks and planning on how to add a more permanent tradition to Saline's sister city relationship with Brecon, Wales. Plans for next year are already underway.

And as an ending note - the mayor of Saline is a woman McGregor, Mrs. Gretchen Drisksll.

#### GRANDFATHER MOUNTAIN HIGHLAND GAMES

A brief history of ACGS participation and Report of Games - July 8-11, 1999

The Grandfather Mountain Highland Games are one of the largest, most colorful and bestattended of all the Games on the East Coast, due in part to their spectacular location on MacRae Meadows of magnificent Grandfather Mountain. As there has been a gap in our reporting of this event in recent years, below is a brief history of ACGS participation in these Games, and remarks covering the 1999 Games. When queried, Assistant Chieftain Joe Tichy provided a wealth of information: it is regrettable that time and space prohibits reporting all of the interesting stories he recalled.

Nestor J. MacDonald, one of the founding fathers of Grandfather Mountain Highland Games in 1955, approached one of his personal friends, Harry Blunt (Then ACGS Assist. Chieftain) concerning the possibility of Clan Gregor becoming a Charter Clan of these Games. It did not take Harry Blunt long to convince other members of ACGS, and Harry and Edith Blunt, Bill and Lou McGregor, Joe and Peg Tichy, John and Margaret McAdams, John and Mary Tyler Urquhart and Arthur and Betty Lecky became enthusiastic supporters and hosts of the first Clan Gregor tent. ACGS has been represented each of the 44 years of these Games: in fact, it was not long before attendance of members, prospects and visitors grew to such a point that ACGS reserved two tent spaces, as they are doing now.

In turn, Nestor MacDonald became such a supporter of ACGS, that in 1970 he and his wife Helen were named the first Honorary Members of our Society.

ACGS introduced the Tossing of the Sheath to these Games and has provided the Trophy for this event.

In 1970 our Hereditary Chieftain Sir Gregor MacGregor of MacGregor and his wife Fanny came from Scotland to be the Guest of Honor at the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games.

Abbey W. Magruder, Jr. (ACGS Chieftain 1987-1990) became Vice-President of Grandfather Mountain Highland Games for two years and then President in 1985 and 1986.

Grandfather Mountain Highland Games are first and foremost a family-oriented event. From 1985-1987 Tom and Maggie Gregg of Mt. Pleasant, SC were the hosts of the ACGS tent; their son Alan R. Gregg acted as photographer and reporter of the Games events for our Yearbook. Alan's son Ian (who has just become a Junior Member of ACGS) has attended the Games several times and he led ACGS in the Parade of Tartans in 1997.

Following Tom and Maggie as hosts of the ACGS tent, Lou and Bill McGregor and Joe and Peg Tichy became co-hosts, extending their warm hospitality and wisdom to all members and prospects who visited. In 1992, Jeffrey McGregor, his wife Frieda (and son Jason) assumed the responsibilities of hosting the tent, with the assistance of Jeff's parents, Dave and Suzanne McGregor, and they continue to do so today.

Over the years, Clan Gregor has been represented in the athletic Clan competitions. Of special mention was our current Surgeon, Dr. Thomas McNish, who in his youth set a high standard by becoming Athlete of the Day!! Carl Petersen, renowned Scottish Balladeer, has worn the MacGregor Tartan and represented ACGS in the kilted Mile (adult group) several times recently. In 1998, Jason Seidman (Member #2001JA - son of Frieda McGregor) placed third in the Kilted Mile for ages 13-15 yrs.

Clan Gregor has also been represented at the Kirking of the Tartan, with Thad Osborne, Deputy Chieftain for Tennessee, carrying our Tartan Banner most recently for these services.

Members, prospects and visitors to the Clan Tent are extended such hospitality that it is not long before they become "regulars" too. If you decide to attend the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games, it is advisable to make plans well in advance, as they have become a huge tourist attraction, not only to those of Scottish descent, but the general public as well. Accommodations in the nearby vicinities of Banner Elk, Boone and Blowing Rock are becoming difficult to obtain, so early booking of rooms is a MUST!

"The first people to raise smoke and boil water in Glenorchy, Glenlyon and Glenstrae, 'the Children of the Mist' - CLAN MacGREGOR IS HERE!" Thus our Chieftain Malcolm G. MacGregor answered the Call for the Gathering of the Clans during the Torchlight Ceremony opening the 44th Annual Grandfather Mountain Highland Games on Thursday evening, July 8, 1999. A slight drizzle and mist descending from the mountain top gave a touch of authenticity to this very stirring performance. This event was preceded by the arrival on the field of the participants in "The Bear", the 5-mile footrace from Linville to the top of the mountain, as well as sheep dog demonstrations, a barbecue and performances by massed pipe bands. An impressive program such as this should not be missed!

This year, for the first time, the field on MacRae Meadows was open from 9:00 AM to 2:30 PM on Friday for preliminary music and athletic competitions, as well as sheepdog performances. Scottish Country Dancing, Irish Step Dancing, Square Dancing and Clogging were performed on a new dance platform. The Clan Gregor tent was not open on Friday,



Editor's Note: Several years ago I started a new tradition of re-printing a biographical sketch from one of the early yearbooks. These sketches are most interesting and a very valuable source of genealogical information. I hope that some of you may be encouraged to submit a sketch on an ancestor for inclusion in a later yearbook. This year I have chosen a sketch on Mrs. Isabella MacGregor Dorsett. It comes from the Yearbook of 1925, and was written by her daughter, Suzie Mitchell (Dorsett) McColl.

#### MRS. ISABELLA MacGREGOR DORSETT

By Suzie Mitchell (Dorsett) McColl

Isabella MacGregor Dorsett, the seventh daughter of Nathaniel Mortimer MacGregor and Susan Euphemia Mitchell, of Edinburgh, Scotland, was born in Washington, D.C. July 23, 1841 and was educated at Miss Rucker's Seminary; by private tutors, and at Dr. McLeod's finishing school for young ladies.

Just prior to the Civil War, her Father being in full sympathy with the South, disposed of his merchantile business in Washington, and established his family on his plantation in Prince George's County, Maryland, where he remained until his death on June 14, 1870.

Miss Belle MacGregor, by which name the subject of this sketch was well known among her many friends and acquaintances, was also an acknowledged social belle among them, and in addition to being a very handsome and attractive girl, was gifted with a beautiful voice and a remarkable talent for the guitar and piano. She clung to her music through the many years of her life and it was a great comfort and pleasure to her and to those intimately associated with her. Up until a few months prior to her death she sang and played with the most remarkable sweetness and power. Always at Christmas there was a family gathering at her ancestral home "The Rest" in Prince George's County, Maryland (which was inherited by her and where her closing years were spent) and the members of her family including her children and grandchildren, would group around the piano and sing with her, as leader, Christmas carols and anthems making the old house ring with the joyous music.

Miss Bell MacGregor married Thomas Somervell Dorsett, who was the 2nd son of Col. William Newman Dorsett and Amelia Somervell, his wife, both of Prince George's County, Maryland.

The marriage of Belle MacGregor and Somervell Dorsett was consummated at Trinity Church, Upper Marlboro, Md. by Rev. Henry I. Kenshaw, on Dec. 3, 1868. A double ceremony was performed, Agnes Woods MacGregor, a younger sister of Belle MacGregor, and Thomas Truman Somervell Bowie, a first cousin of Thomas Somervell Dorsett, being the other contracting parties.

Four children were born to Mrs. Dorsett, two of whom died in infancy. Her only son, and third child, William Newman Dorsett, was a charter member, a councilman and very active in the interests of the American Clan Gregor Society. Her only surviving daughter is (Mrs.) Suzie Mitchell McColl, of Washington, D.C. and Prince George's County,

Maryland, who is also a member of the Society.

Mr. Dorsett met with a serious accident while riding a spirited colt, which rendered him an invalid for life, when his two children were very small. The accident caused an injury to the base of his spine, which resulted in a gradual paralysis for which the physicians of those days knew no cure. Mrs. Dorsett took him from one famous physician to another, until their resources were exhausted. Then Mrs. Dorsett, who had been reared in luxury with slaves at her beck and call, found herself facing life with an invalid husband and two small children to provide for. She met the emergency bravely and for some years taught in the public schools of Prince George's County, Maryland. Under Cleveland's administration she obtained a position in the auditor's office of the Treasury Department where she served until her children were able to provide for her. She resided in Washington, D.C. for a number of years, moving to the old home place in Prince George's in the latter part of her life where she died after a few months illness on Oct. 11, 1923.

Funeral services were held at Epiphany Church, Forestville, Md. Rev. W. C. Shears, officiating, on Oct. 13, 1923 with her nephews acting as body bearers, and the interment took place in the church ceremony.

Mrs. Dorsett was a member of Epiphany Protestant Episcopal church, Washington, D.C. for many years before and until her death.

She was a charter member of the American Clan Gregor Society and attended the meetings regularly being much interested in everything concerning its interests.

She was a woman of strong character and although she suffered much physical pain during the last few years of her life she was always bright and cheerful and concealed as far as possible her suffering from those around her.

The idol of her life was her grandson, her only son's only boy, Telfair Bowie Dorsett, who spent much of his babyhood and boyhood with her on the farm and who was a great source of pleasure and comfort to her in her old age. She had one granddaughter, Mrs. Suzie Mr. Dorsett MacAllister of whom she was also very fond.

Mrs. Dorsett was the daughter of Nathaniel Mortimer MacGregor and Susan Euphemia Mitchell, granddaughter of John Smith Magruder and Eleanor Clark (born Hall), great granddaughter of Nathaniel and Margaret Magruder (daughter of James Magruder and Barbara Coombs), great-great granddaughter of John Magruder and Susanna Smith, great-great-great granddaughter of Samuel Magruder and Sarah Beall, and great-great-great-great granddaughter of Alexander Magruder, Maryland immigrant.

Editor's Note: Each year we reprint an article of interest from a past yearbook. This year I have chosen to go back seventy-four years to the 1926 yearbook. This is a letter from George Corbin Washington Magruder telling of his pursuit of new members for the Society. We hope that you will enjoy it.

#### LETTER OF G. C. W. MAGRUDER

### "The Highlands."

July 11, 1925

My dear Friend and Fellow Clansman:

I wish to thank our faithful Scribe for a letter of December 5, 1924 with inclosures; also for one of July, 1925, in which he stated that the Society expected a good report from me of my work in Oklahoma for the ensuing year.

He said it was not nearly so hard to secure new members as many of us imagined. To show you that I have made an effort to hunt up new members, I laid down my work on the farm and canvassed Oklahoma City last Tuesday and Wednesday. Thermometer from 100 to 109 degrees. Now, I am 70 years young, having passed the three score and ten mile-stone of this life the 11th of June.

I have suffered with rheumatism in my feet for several years and I find it difficult to walk in the city, even with the aid of my cane. After consulting the latest directory and phone book I found fourteen persons by the name of McGregor and Gregory, but not one Magruder. According to the directory they are rare birds.

My son gave me the name of a Magruder at Packingtown. Will have to make a special hunt for him. Out of the fourteen names I located five of the name McGregor and Gregory in Oklahoma City. Being satisfied that two of them would have to be traced to Scotland via Africa, I concluded to cut their names out then and there.

After pacing up and down many streets and skyscrapers, and meeting with many disappointments, I finally came upon one George G. McGregor, clerk in Freight Department, Rock Island Railroad Company. Finding him a busy man, concluded best to ask for his home address, and promised to call to see him there some time when I might have his attention.

I was pleased with him. I then called to see Dr. A. E. Gregory who has been a resident of Okalahoma City for years. I have known him since 1906. But have my reasons for not calling upon him sooner. He seemed interested, read the little folder, gave me his attention, and I promised to show him one of our Year Books later.

My son Lyles has recently accepted a position as traveling salesman for southwestern Oklahoma (six months) for a firm in Oklahoma City. I asked Lyles to take the address of all of the name of Magruder, McGregor, McGregory, or Gregory, that he might meet or hear of and send the name to me. I may be able to find some new members through him. He gave me the name of Fred Magruder, an oil man of Tulsa when here last, and I wrote to this

gentleman yesterday and sent him a folder and application paper.

My experience has been that the Southern and Eastern people like to talk family pedigree first, while the Northern people take up that subject last.


But I am not discouraged. I keep boosting A. C. G. S. whenever I hear of one of our name, and I write to or go to see him. I read a few days ago of a Presbyterian missionary in India who had worked hard for three years in one place and had made three converts. If he was not discouraged why should we be. If each of us could bring in one new member a year we would equal the Indian missionary in numbers.

My dear friends, I do feel so much for you all in the great loss of our beloved Chieftain. His death was a great blow to me, coming so soon after the death of my dear brother Julian. I loved our Chieftain for his character as a man, father, friend, and Christian. His lovely friendly letters are precious keepsakes. Whilst I never had the pleasure of knowing him in person, I learned to love him from his letters and I wrote him more than once that I looked forward to the day when I might meet him face to face and lay my hand in his.

Whenever I may turn to his picture in my Year Book and the annual gathering call us to meet together, we will continue to be impressed with his greatness as a lovable man; and I shall see in visions as it were, his spirit leading us and cheering us onward in the good work he laid down, that we might continue to even greater success.


### **NEWS NOTES FROM LILLIAN**
