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Proofreaders Needed (Submitted by Scott MacGregor)



The society is currently undertaking an in-house project to scan our nearly one hundred years of society yearbooks using OCR software and then converting them into a final PDF format that is searchable. This will allow the society yearbook collection to be searched for genealogical purposes and made available for sale on either CD or DVD media.

To achieve the final objective we are in need of assistance from several members who can spare a few hour a week and have a computer with MS Word, along with e-mail access. The yearbooks are scanned in sections of roughly twenty pages which then require proofing and editing to ensure that the text read reflects the original. Those volunteers doing the proofreading will receive via e-mail a file containing graphic images of the pages and an MS Word document of these same pages. The original document will not be distributed. If you're willing to volunteer and assist with this endeavor please drop Scott MacGregor an e-mail at mcgregr@verizon.net and let him know. This volunteer based project is projected to take a couple of years to complete. The more volunteers the better.





News from the General Marshall Magruder Library (Submitted by Steven C. Grier)





In March of 2007, Sandy MacGregor and Scott MacGregor assisted me in moving the Society's yearbook collection from a storage unit in Virginia to one closer to my home in Pennsylvania. In the course of our packing up the yearbooks, we stumbled upon a carton which contained four banners. None of us had an immediate explanation for the purpose of these banners. Upon closer inspection, we noticed the banners had stars on them. I said to Sandy and Scott that something about these banners was familiar. Later in the week, I remembered something while studying the contents of the Society's archives at the University of Baltimore's Langsdale Library. On a subsequent trip to the library, I retrieved the files which I thought addressed this mystery. Sure enough, Society members had recorded their efforts to create banners to honor and remember Society members and family having served in World War I, World War II, Korean War and Viet Nam War.

From my brief research, it is evident Society members believed it quite important to recognize those that have served our country in times of war. It is hard to tell from the archives when the banners were last displayed. Realizing this recognition has been an integral part of previous Annual Gatherings, and in an effort to make the Society's rich archives more accessible. I am planning a display of these banners at our Centennial Gathering in 2009. I will also bring some of the interesting historical documents surrounding the banners.





To acquaint everyone with the banners, I have included a photo of each. Note on each banner there are gold star (s) and blue star (s). The gold star (s) represent the number of person (s) having died in service, and the blue star (s) represent the number of person (s) having served. The banner with two gold stars and fifty blue stars honors those having served in World War I; the banner with the numbers 13 and 493

honors those having served in World War II; the banner with the numbers 1 and 27, with a tartan ribbon border, honors those having served in the Korean War; and, the banner with 1 gold star and 27 blue stars, with the red

top and bottom border, honors those having served in the Viet Nam War.

In the next several issues, I will discuss some of the many gems in our archives. I hope this stirs your interest not only in your genealogy but also in the history of the Society.

Cock-a-Leekie Soup

from Carolynn Black-Stoops - Serves 4-6

A fine and traditional Scots first course. Add chicken meat, vegetables, and barley to make this a heart-warming meal on a chilly Spring day.

 6 leeks 1 teaspoon salt 5 cups strong chicken stock 3 Tblsp butter (even better with chicken fat) 1/2 cup whipping cream salt and pepper to taste optional: 	• Cut off the roots and dark green parts of the leeks. Slice in half lengthwise. Rinse well in cold water to re- move all the sand and slice into half moon shapes.
	• Bring the stock to a boil, add leeks, then reduce heat and simmer for about 5 minutes.
1/2 cup chopped prunes	• Whisk in butter (or chicken fat) and season.
	• Stir in the cream (and prunes) at the end.
	Ladle into bowls, and serve immediately.

Across The Pond...a word from our Chief, Sir Malcolm MacGregor

"The Young MacGregor"

This is a charming letter from John MacGregor Murray to my father a schoolboy at Eton College, aged 13 at the time, just prior to WW II. It confirms the origins of the pipe tune 'The Young MacGregor'. It also reveals much of the nature of clanship which I am glad to say has not really changed over the years. I think that the gathering John Murray referred to would have been the last for six years or so as war was imminent. Many MacGregors would not have made it or would have been recovering from fighting their way across Europe. All rather moving stuff.

Dear Master Gregor,

I must thank you for your kind letter, received recently. I'm so glad you liked your Pipe March, "The Young MacGregor", as I must say I derived great pleasure in composing it and playing it in your honour. The Clan Gregor gathering was a great success, in fact I think it was one of the happiest, and brightest held for many years. We have the Chief and Lady Mac-Gregor to thank for that, as when they are present with us, we all feel just like a "big happy family" and everyone (clansfolk and friends alike) thoroughly enjoy themselves, as the true clan spirit is very much in evidence. Our only regret was your unavoidable absence. We all would love to have had you with us. What a singing cheer was given when we were informed later, that the Young Chief and Miss Anna Gylla MacGregor were to meet the clansfolk along with Sir Malcolm and Lady MacGregor at the next meeting in august which will be held in the empire exhibition. I can assure you that function is largely looked forward to by us all, and that a real highland welcome awaits you. I shall be very proud again to play your own march that evening, and the clan will show the world how proud they are of the grand old name.

I am a enclosing a few flashshot snaps taken on the 25th, which I think will interest you and your friends at school. I shall notify Lady MacGregor later, when "the Young MacGregor" march will be broadcast so that you can "listen in".

The University of Baltimore Foundation was presented in March with the \$25,000 needed to fund the one year part-time archivist position aimed at preserving and improving the accessibility of our non-book collection by our members, prospective members, and the general public interested in the history of the American Clan Gregor Society and MacGregor in general.

Our society Librarian, Mr. Steven C. Grier, continues to work with our collections archivist, Mr. Tom Hollowak, to hire an individual who meets the requirements of both the university and our society. Interviews were conducted in early June and Mr. Aiden Faust was selected. It's anticipated that he will start his position in early July. This position will run from July 2008 to June 2009.

Mr. Faust is finalizing his Master of Library Science with a concentration in Archives. His experience includes working as a Digital Library Technician with the National Park Service working on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, Mr. Faust has held in various positions while working on other archival projects.

In future issues of this newsletter Steven will be providing more specifics on what Mr. Faust is accomplishing with our non-book collection. I'm definitely looking forward to learning what undiscovered gems lay buried within our collection at the library.

Your continued support, through your contributions even during the troubling times of renewing our 501c3 status, was greatly appreciated and shows the spirit of MacGregors. Not only has this Library Archivist project come to fruition but we are once again in good standing with the IRS towards our non-profit status.

Across The Pond...a word from our Chief, Sir Malcolm MacGregor

Having just returned from the USA, my mind is fresh with the marvelous gathering of MacGregors at Stone Mountain Highland Games. I had the honour of being the chieftain of the games, the first time that a MacGregor chief has performed this role. The Games themselves was a magnificent event, I have not seen so many pipe bands in a long time and the most eye catching was the Royal Canadian Mounted Police pipe band who entertained the crowds with their musical display and colorful uniforms. The whole event had great impact on those who had not witnessed such a diverse array of pipe bands, competitors and spectators. I was one of them. With the increasing use of DNA in solving crimes and in identifying the ancestors of historical individuals such as Thomas Jefferson or Genghis Khan, it might be assumed that DNA has the capability to solve all the problems associated with ancestry, and particularly those difficult cases where the paper trail runs out and there seems to be no way forward. There are exciting things that can be discovered but DNA cannot provide all the answers. It's important to understand this at the outset.

There are testing programs available really for two main strands of DNA. The Y chromosome is one - and this is carried exclusively by the male. Any female interested in her maiden name surname has to do the test by proxy, through a brother, father, uncle or some more distant male relative still bearing the surname. The second DNA test available is mitochondrial or mtDNA for short. All humans

carry mtDNA but only women can pass it on. (This is the opposite for the Y chromosome which is only carried by men and passed on to men only). This DNA is less publicized because generally people do not know their maternal lineage back very far (that is mother's mother and so on).

The Y chromosome test works by testing points on the chromosome and as a result of the scientific process a participant ends up with a series of numbers, sometimes referred to as markers, which indicate how many alleles (roughly repetitions) there are at each place in the chromosome which is tested. It follows that the more places that are tested the easier it is to make comparisons between individuals. Thus there is the 12 marker test - clearly not many markers - and this is used to identify the major group to which a person belongs. In simple terms it is possible to identify, for example, what would be an indigenous British DNA signature from what would be a9 Viking DNA signature using 12 markers but, in general terms this is about all. The greater the number of markers tested (25, 37 or even 67) the greater the chances of beginning to identify family groups. In

some cases like the Orrs it has shown that all but one have a common origin - as I understand it this would be in Ireland (for that family group). This means that they were all descended from one individual. Whether that individual was the original emigrant to the States or whether or just from the same family group, is more difficult to say for certain.

In 1822, King George of England visited Edinburgh, Scotland. During this visit, Clan Gregor served as one of the King's bodyguards and acted as escort to the "Honor of Scotland". The Clan was lead by Sir Evan MacGregor of MacGregor who at the time wore a coat adorned with Caringorm style buttons. The buttons, now privately owned, may be available for purchase by the MacGregors.

As you know, the ACGS is soon to celebrate its 100th Anniversary and Clan Gregor Society founded by Sir Evan will have their 200th anniversary in 2022. It would be especially significant if the MacGregor Societies could work together to recover these treasured pieces of MacGregor history.



The buttons are contained in an original box having a maroon velvet liner and a thin, textured covering possibly of snake skin. There are forty buttons in all, 29 large and 11 small. They are

plain silver with ten scallops holding in the foiled glass inserts. Each button has a loose silver link for attaching to clothing.

The history of the buttons is limited but not entirely obscure. They were first revealed about five years ago when the renown Piper John D. Burgess (1934-2005) sold them before his death. Burgess acquired the buttons from Pipe Major Willie Ross (1879-1965).

The current owners of the buttons have placed a value of L3,750.0 and are willing to work with the MacGregors for the purchase.

More will be said about this in the future. In the meantime, isn't it exciting to know that such relics exist and may possibly be reunited with the MacGregors?

For the Holiday's! Edinburgh Gingerbread

- 8 oz Plain flour 2 ts Ground ginger pn Salt 6 oz Treacle 6 tb Milk 2 oz Sultanas
- 1 ts Bicarbonate of soda
 1 ts Cinnamon
 6 oz Butter
 4 oz Brown sugar
 2 Eggs
 2 oz Almonds; flaked



Sift the flour, spices, salt and soda; and then stir in the fruit and nuts. Melt the butter with the treacle and sugar on a low heat. The mixture should remain coolish but the sugar dissolved. Add the milk and stir in the eggs. Pour the warm mixture into a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly to form a batter. Pour into a greased and lined 2 lb loaf tin. Bake at $325^{\circ}F / 160^{\circ}C / gas$ mark 3 for 1 1/4 hours. This is a fairly heavy recipe and may sink on cooling.
