Treatment of Foreign Students Protested

The Polish American Congress and all its representative organizations have been conducting meetings based on recent articles by Baltimore Sunpapers Staff Writer Wally Roche. What he had uncovered is a program under the direction of the US State Department that grants 4-month work/study visas to 20,000 students worldwide during the summertime. A program that is working for some, but for many others, an experience that should make some US employers ashamed for the way they have treated these guests to our country.

Our concern began with learning of the plight of 4 Polish students that had paid nearly \$2000 to enter the program. Upon arrival in the US, they were left stranded in New York City for 3 days until "their" advisor was available to give them guidance. After the 4 finally arrived in Baltimore, they were shuffled off to Abington MD, in an isolated rural apartment 7 miles from where they were to work and immediately intimidated to sign a contract for housing at approximately 3 times the going rate for rental The contract initiated by apartments. McDonalds Restaurant Representatives, where they were to work, also stipulated each student to pay a \$200 cash security deposit Transportation back and forth to their work at McDonalds was \$15! The checks at the end of the workweek were \$0.00 because of apartment rent and miscellaneous deductions As we have found out, the case of these students is similar to stories being played out throughout the whole US by unscrupulous employers who take advantage of students.

The action the Polish American Congress-Maryland Division has taken is twofold: first to assist the students we are aware of, and second; to initiate action through our State and Federal Governmental Agencies to investigate the sources and causes that have allowed certain US Corporations to deprive the students of their lawfully deserved wages.

To provide immediate relief to 2 of the students, low cost housing was found by PAC member Krystyna Osowski in Baltimore City, near the location where jobs were also found. Currently, the other students are employed in menial jobs near Rehoboth Beach but by the time this newsletter is read, we hope to have all the students in Baltimore gainfully employed with money in their pockets for their return to Poland in October.

A 'Resolution' was passed by PAC Maryland Division which we have asked our State and Federal Representatives to take action on behalf of us, their constituents, to thoroughly investigate the deceptive practices of some employers of the students, which for the companies involved, is a source of "cheap labor". We, as residents of Maryland and Citizens of the United States, are disgusted with this abhorrent practice. The National Office of the Polish American Congress is preparing to take similar action to stop the abuse that they are aware of nationwide.

If you would like to join us in this effort, you are welcome to our next meeting of the PAC on Thursday Sept. 5th at 7 PM at the PNA 1627 Eastern Avenue, Baltimore.

On the extremely hot and humid morning of July 17th, we were assembled very close to the podium on the South Lawn of the White House. President Bush and President Kwasniewski gave stirring speeches of the historical and cultural ties that exist between both nations. President Bush stated that "This friendship is rooted in our common history and sustained by our common values." Later President Kwasniewski gave his insight that "The United States and Poland can do much individually, but together they can achieve much more." The speeches made us proud to be an American.

Following that ceremony, a luncheon was held at the Department of State where Secretary of State Powell and his wife greeted Poland's President, his wife, entourage, and guests. The theme, of the speeches, is the major role that Poland plays in European security, and as a member of NATO. Poland is known throughout the world as the United States strongest ally in the war on terrorism. Turning to the audience, President Kwasniewski said, "I raise the toast to your health, to Poland and America and to our successful future in the 21st century".

NATIONAL KATYN MEMORIAL FOUNDATION



The gray drabness of winter that had given our Katyn Monument a somber aura has now been replaced with summer's hot bright sun. Unfortunately, this same bright sun, coupled with our current drought, has continued the somber appearance by browning out the grass lawn at the site. Our group has retained a commercial lawn service, which is serving to keep the weeds under control, but it appears installation of an irrigation system will have to be considered. The drabness of the lawn is offset by the attractive flowerbeds some of our committee members have planted and continue to maintain.

The site continues to be an attraction for many residents of and visitors to Baltimore. A drive-by at any time during the day will reveal visitors reading the tablets or gazing up at the historical figures. On occasion, an automobile is stopped in the circle, with someone standing beside it taking photos.

On April 21, we held our second annual commemoration. The day began with a Mass in Polish at Holy Rosary Church, followed by a wreath-laying ceremony at the monument, and then by a reception at the PNA hall including a viewing of a video entitled "The Forgotten Odyssey". The video was very well-received because it depicted more of the KATYN story. The subject of the film was the deportation to Siberia and Kazakhstan of more than a million Poles from the eastern parts of Poland annexed by the Soviet Union. Included among these deportees were the widows and orphans of the murdered KATYN martyrs who lived in those eastern areas. Among our guests and commemoration attendees this representatives from the Polish Embassy and its military attachés.

An additional highlight since our last newsletter was the visit to our Monument, on August 17th, of a distinguished Delegation of Economic who had accompanied Polish Advisors President Kwaśniewski on his official State Visit to the United States. This delegation included the Undersecretary of the Prime Minister's Office, Slawomir Cytrycki. who laid a red and white flower wreath at the Monument. It is pleasing to note that a visit to our Monument was important enough to be included in the very tight schedule of meetings concerning important economic, trade, and other international issues



In addition to Mr. Cytrycki, the Delegation of Economic Advisors included Mr. Witold Orlowski, Mr. Marek Wejtko, Mrs. Henryka Bochniarz, Mr. Andrzej Arendarski, Mr. Cezary Stypulkowski, and Mr. Marek Jozeflak.

Representing the Embassy of the Republic of Poland were Mr. Wieslaw Wodyk, Mrs. Teresa Orczykowska, and Mr. Jacek Dobrowski.

The Katyn Foundation welcoming committee included Chairman William Krol, Past Chairman Alfred Wisniewski, Mr. Richard Poremski and N. Frank Lanocha.

POLISH LEGION OF AMERICAN VETERANS

The Polish Legion of American Veterans, Casimir Pulaski Post #209, has elected four delegates to the bi-annual PLAV national convention in Connecticut in August. The delegates are Robert Bieschke, Frederick Karr, Stephen Lesniewski and Raymond Dombrowski.

Walter Czawlytko, a member of Post 209, was the winner of the post's 50-50 raffle. He was awarded \$405 for his share of the prize. The post thanks those who participated in this project.

A beautiful executed and framed copy of the Constitution of the United States was prepared and presented to Post #209 by member Herman Kolakowski at the April meeting. The large piece is currently housed at the PNA Hall and will be displayed as soon as an ideal location is found.

Among the items of business at a recent meeting was the swearing-in ceremony for new members of the post. Membership has reached nearly 70 men and women and interested persons are invited to join the group.

Veterans of Polish extraction are urged to read a story related in a book entitled <u>We Regret to inform You....</u>, which deals with the ordeal of Prisoner of war Walter Czawlytko. Mr. Czawlytko, a member of the Army Air Forces in World War II, was trained as an aerial waist gunner and was assigned to the 8th Air Force when he was 19 years old. It was while he was flying his second mission that the crew was forced to abandon the plane and all 10 men were captured and placed in German prisoner of war camps.

When it became evident the war was winding down the prisoners were evacuated and forced to march across Germany in freezing weather, a straggling band of men barely clothed, ill and starving. The Black Death March is recalled, as one of the most inhumane acts ever perpetrated against prisoners.

The Czawlytko story is brief, plainly narrated and riveting. Czawlytko's story is one of 12 such tales of former prisoners of war included in the book. He is a respected member of Post #209.

The newly formed color guard under the direction of Robert Bieschke has begun service with two appearances on Memorial Day. The first formal ceremony they participated was at St. Casimir's Church on May 27th. Members of the color guard include Robert Bieschke, Woislaw Milan-Kamski, Ben Podowski, Ronald Lesniewski, Dawn Priebe and Commander Raymond Dombrowski.

Their final stop was at the Katyn Memorial where they learned there were many other Poles who were massacred during World War II-a story not generally well known or given much publicity. Thanks to Tom Hollowak, all the children were given an "Outline of the History of Poland", a beautiful chronological presentation of polish heroes, including pictures and other illustrations. It was a great day for the PHA to make others aware of our heritage.

For the 29th consecutive year, the Polish Heritage Association has awarded scholarships to deserving and qualified students for the upcoming school year. This year there were 46 applications received competing for the 7 available \$1,000 grants. 


