11. Brooch and Chalice Cup made from the wood of the old Mulberry Tree, the first Peace treaty tree of Maryland. Loaned by Mrs. T. E. Brome.

18. Brass Candlestick, from Riverdale, the Calvert home near Washington. Loaned by Mrs. A. B. Bibbins.
