Isaac R. Trimble, born in Virginia, graduated from West Point July 1, 1822, and appointed Brevet Second Lieutenant Third Artillery; Second Lieutenant First Artillery, July 1, 1822; served : on ordnance duty August 21, 1822; in garrison at Fort Lafavette, New York, 1823-4; on topographical duty June 4, 1824, to June 14, 1830, and in garrison at Fort Monroe, Virginia ( Artillery School for practice), 1830,1831; resigned May 31, 1832, and became a civil engineer, and was employed 1832--1861 upon various railroads. A resident of Baltimore, Md., he took part in the Secession movements there, but on its occupation by the Federal troops withdrew to the South and entered the Confederate States army as Brigadier-General; was promoted Major-General and wounded at Gettysburg( losing his left foot), and captured and taken to Johnson's Island. After the war he engaged in manufacturing in Baltimore, Md.

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Gen. I. R. Trimble made a report of operations of his brigade from 14th to 29th of August 1862. Report dated Charlottesville, Jan. 20, 1863.

He wrote an article in the Southern Historical Papers, volume 26, pages 116-128, on " The Battle and Campaign of Gettysburg". The original of this manuscript was in the possession of Major Graham Daves of North Carolina.

He made an address Feb. 22, 1883 in which he mentions some Marylanders in the Confederate Army.

There are several references in the Rebellion Records to his activities.
