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

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of ACIL is to develop in emerging leaders international leadership skills that will enable them to contribute to a more stable national and global society.

ACIL is committed to three unique objectives:

- To create opportunities for a diverse group of developing leaders from the United States and their counterparts abroad, many of whom would not normally have the chance to participate in a serious international dialogue. The Center's programs primarily serve young and mid-career professionals between the ages of 25 and 45.
- To pioneer in building bridges to countries where official and private relations have been strained or non-existent. Against a backdrop of superpower rivalry, for example, ACIL developed an extensive network of personal and professional contacts between young leaders in the United States, the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe.
- To focus domestic programs in regions of the United States where opportunities for an extended dialogue with foreign leaders and experts seldom exist.

Europe-America Emerging Leaders Conference Concept and Organization

Purpose:

To identify and develop a working infrastructure of those persons responsible for managing the issues of the 21st Century in the near and long-term future.

Format:

A six-day conference divided into approximately 20 commissions. Each commission will focus on a specific set of issues. The commissions will be divided into four sections: (1) Economic, (2) Political, (3) Environmental, and (4) Human Needs and Values.

Commission Coordinators

A coordinator for each commission will be selected. While heavy preference will be to draw the coordinator from the Washington-Baltimore section, the coordinator may be from anywhere in the USA.

Coordinators are selected with four primary criteria in mind: (1) Knowledge of subject area, (2) widely respected by peers, (3) an active recruiter of US delegates, and (4) openness to other points of view.

Recruitment of participants

US participants will be recruited by ACIL and the commission coordinators.

European participants will be selected by ACIL and/or other selected European-related bodies in cooperation and consultation with selected governments and other networks. US commission chairs may also be helpful to the nomination process.

Conference Format

The conference will have seven sessions per commission. There also will be an opening and closing plenary, each with a major European or US speaker. Plenary sessions will be open to the public.

On-site visits to interests related to this commission will also be structured in the program.

Community Involvement

Community involvement is highly desired. Community events will be structured in an evening program.

Follow-up

The specific charge of each commission will be to move the discussions to focus upon concrete programs that can be followed through by commission members themselves and their respective organizations as well as recommendations for ACIL.

Four to six weeks after the conference, commission chairs will meet with the planning committee to review the conference and its recommendations and explore next steps.

For ACIL, it is expected that several specific program options will develop.

Delegates will also be encouraged to publish their views nationally and internationally.

This structure assures that each commission will be represented by each of the eight largest nations of Europe and Canada. On the average five delegates from the remaining delegates would be in each commission. Therefore each commission would have approximately 24 persons (10 USA, 1 Canada, 13 Europeans).
