Dear Mr. Secretary:

This letter concerns our conversation of the other day, regarding the intense political pressure exerted by the Croatian-American community on the Administration to back their cause, based on the supposition that the majority of Croatian-Americans are Republicans.

This is simply not an accurate statement.

The majority of people of Yugoslavian descent in the eastern United States, be they Croatian, Serbian, or Slovenian, are workers in the steel, mining and other blue-collar industries, and by default, have historically voted, and continue to vote Democrat.

As later generations of Yugoslav-Americans continued their westward migration, those who became involved in white-collar and professional pursuits changed to the Republican party because it best represented their needs. This accounts for the Republican affiliation of a minority, and I will stress minority, of these individuals. In fact, the only large conservative voting block of Yugoslav-Americans are Serbian-Americans who changed their affiliation to Republican after WWII, due to the perceived sell-out by Presidents Roosevelt and Truman in allowing Tito and the Communists to assume control of Yugoslavia.

I would caution you to be careful in depending on any Croatian-American votes in the upcoming election. Current sentiment in the Croatian-American press in very anti-Bush, and even with U.S. recognition of Croatia, I believe that it will stay that way due to both the lack of involvement in, and the slow action by the Administration on the Yugoslav crisis.

I would respectfully request that you take the myth of a substantial "conservative voting bloc" of Croatian-Americans with the requisite grain of salt. The Serbian-American population of the U.S. represents at least as large a block, and while not as well organized, certainly will cast its votes in reflection of President Bush's Yugoslav policy.

of a Chicago site for a new \$10.8 hillion airport, the normally ornery local papers suggested he'd learned more than fractured diction at his father's knee. The Chicago Tribune even said Daley's "stunning victory" in getting a bi-state commission to agree to build the airport at Lake Calumet, on the gritty, industrial Southeast Side 14 miles from the Loop, was "the higgest coup for a hig-city mayor in decades," a political second coming of sorts. It's no small compliment in these parts, given that some people still talk about the "Old Man" in the kind of hushed tones otherwise reserved for Mussolini in southern Italy.

At the moment, it doesn't seem to matter that building the new airport would require leveling thousands of homes obliterating a few hundred acres of wetlands and relocating parts of two rivers Never mind that it would sit atop dozen of toxic sites. And might not be needed at all. Ever since 5.000 people lined up in a snowstorm for 500 jobs at a new downtown hotel, people around here have been looking for some good economic news, and this is it. Supporters say the massive public works undertaking will create 200,000 jobs and pump up to \$15 billion a year into the contourny.

Getting the 8.200-acre Southeast Side site chosen over neighboring down-and-out Gary, Ind., and three rural locations after eight years of intense wrangling finally proved Daley knows how to play half.

Two years ago, he enlisted then-Transportation Secretary Samuel K. Skinner to modify the site-selection committee to add three Chicagoans to the three Illinois residents already there, guaranteeing they'd outnumber the Indianans on the commission. In February, Daley sculed the deal. He won the support of Illinois Republican Gov. Jim Edgar by agreeing to share control over the new airport (plus the currently Chicago-run O'Haro and Midway Airports) and its construction contracts and jobs.

The airport could come back to haunt the mayor. Its projected cost has already doubled. Turning the depressed Southeast Side into an airport would mean demolishing about 8.000 homes in mostly poor and working-class neighborhoods. The protests have started, and litigation alone could stretch beyond the airport's projected opening in 2005, And that doesn't take into account a \$1 billion-plus

ALONG THE CAMPAIGN TRAIL

There haven't been many winners in Yugoslavia's bloody civil war, but the campaign treasuries of Patrick J. Buchanan and Bill Clinton have benefited indirectly from the conflict.

Croatian-Americans, traditionally a well-heeled, politically active and Republican-leaning ethnic group, are angry that President Bush took so long to formally recognize Croatia, which seceded from the Yugoslav federation last summer. Early this year, they showed their displeasure by rallying around Buchanan; Robert V. Schneider, a Washington lobbyist for the Croatian-American Association, estimates that Croatian-Americans have raised at least \$100,000 in campaign contributions for Buchanan.

Now, they are reaching out to Clinton. Representatives of the Croatian-American Association began meeting with the Clinton campaign several weeks ago, encouraging the Democratic hopeful to speak out on the issue. They were delighted when Clinton included a plug for Croatian independence in a major foreign policy speech that he delivered in New York City on April 1.

Now, Croatian-Americans are planning major fund-raising events for Clinton in at least five states, Schneider said. "The Democratic Party has a tremendous opportunity here," he said. "The Bush Administration has treated them [Croatian-Americans] with disrespect."

Former Jesse Jackson campaign aide Steve Cobble has started an independent effort to get the two-time White House hopeful drafted for the No. 2 spot on the Democratic ticket. In letters to about 150 of Jackson's 1988 supporters, Cobble encouraged them to round up perition signatures, lobby convention delegates and alternates and contact their local news media. Jackson adviser Frank Watkins said Jackson was "aware" of the effort but "doesn't have an opinion on it." Jackson has said he would run if nominated.

From now to the July convention, Watkins said, Jackson would continue to work on voter registration and get-out-the-vote efforts and urge Bill Clinton and Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown Jr. to "broaden their message." Watkins also said it was "likely" that Jackson will be appearing in states that have yet to hold their Democratic presidential primaries.

with the recent retirement announcements by Reps. Byron L. Dorgan. D-N.D., and Frank J. Guarini, D-N.J., at least 56 House Members are certain not to be back next year because of retirement, defeat or a hid for another office. That is one of the highest totals this early in the cycle since the end of World War II, according to Vital Statistics on Congress 1991-92 (CQ Press), Prospects are growing that the number of new Members will exceed the 92 elected in 1974 and may reach the postwar record of 118 freshmen in 1948,

Dorgan, who is seeking the Senate seat to be vacated by retiring Kern Conrad, D-N.D., became the 11th House Member (8 Democrats, 3 Republicans) to run for the Senats. Guarini joins 22 other Democrats and 9 Republicans in announcing his retirement. In addition, one Democrat and one Republican are running for governor and five Democrats already have lost their primary reelection bids. Six pairs of incumbents have matched up for redistricting-forced contests in which at least one is certain to lose; of those, one is in a Democratic primary, two are in Republican contests and three will be in November. With Dorgan and Guarini stepping down, the number of Ways and Means Committee retirees has reached nine (seven Democrats and two Republicans).
